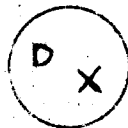

Mail was received this month from Jim Pirch, Thomas J. Hidley, Dennis Smith, Dave Webb and Mr. Bingham in Postus, Missouri. I also received some interesting brochure from the Finney Company of New Bedford, Ohio. It looks as if they have put out a real hot FM antenna this year. It really interest me as do their UHF antennas.

I received an article from Dennis Smith who is now at Berkely, California going to the University there, I presume. It is from the Tuesday, March 15, 1960 edition of the San Francisco Examiner. It is datelined Bay Shore, New York. It seems as if a patient, Edward McBride, at the Southside Hospital enjoys television and a fresh smelling room. I would like for any member with the ability to draw to send me an ID slide for the station. The following information should be on it: KBES-TV, Medford, Oregon, Serving Southern Oregon and Northern California. I will take the best drawings to the station for their approval. He also said that he would be very happy to run a DX test for us next summer. He said that he could let us know a week or ten days in advance. I don't beleive that I mentioned this last month, but KBES was received in New Hampshire by double hop E skip February 15, 1960, did any other members notice any activity that day. The DXer was a Ham operator and I have contacted him for possible membership in the club. This might also be a good way to enlist members, by contacting local television stations particularly during the summer and write to reporters of reception that aren't a member of our club already. As you all know I enjoy mail, by the way I have the tape of Art and Kings broadcast from Canada and I don't have a mailing list of members with a tape recorder, if you are interested in getting it send me your name and address. 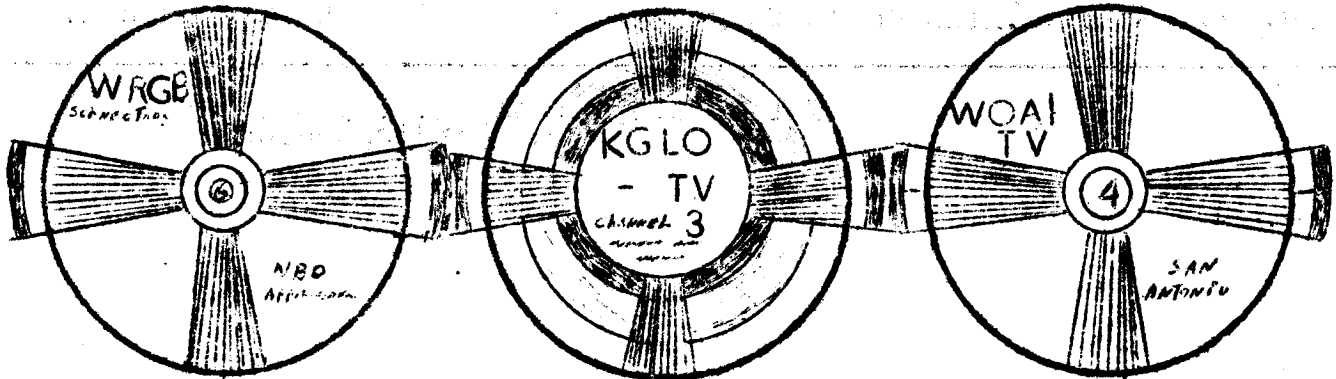

INTERNATIONAL TV-DX COLUMN

Well, TV-DX must really be poor this month because reports received here are down to nil. In part, that is the reason that this column will be shorter than is usual. The other part is the fact that some mix-up somewhere prevented me from receiving the blank stencils upon which this column is originally typed. What happened?

The number of Canadian television stations is going to take a big leap forward as you all must know by now. The Board of Broadcast Governors has recently approved channels 10 and 12 for Montreal. Channel 10 will be occupied by a new French language station and channel 12 will be occupied by CFCF-TV (English). The two are not expected to open until late 1961 to allow for the construction on Montreal's Mount Royal of a new tower to accommodate the 4 TV stations and 4 FM outlets as well as the police radio antenna. Toronto is still awaiting the outcome of hearings for channel 9 there.

In the absence of any real DX to report or any new developments I'd like to use some of the space in this month's column to explain one form of TV propagation. This will be continued next month if space permits and so on until we cover most of the modes of propagation. This is particularly for newcomers to the group.

TROPOSPHERIC PROPAGATION (EXTENDED GROUND WAVE): This is generally speaking the form of propagation that provides normal television reception in extreme fringe areas. The conventional theory about high-frequency waves teaches that the frequencies used for television are so high that television waves will behave like light waves when transmitted and will thereby be detectable only within a line-of-sight distance. However television waves when propagated thru the atmosphere will not travel in the same manner thru sections of the atmosphere that are differently constituted. This includes hot humid masses of air, etc. In these cases the waves will be scattered and will tend to travel beyond the normal line of sight. This is much the same thing as one sees when approaching the outskirts of a city at night. The city lights can be seen as a glow on the horizon far before the city itself is within line-of-sight range. This effect on television waves results in TV signals being seen quite a lot farther than the line-of-sight range. Needless to say this effect is largely dependant upon weather and also the time of day. In the morning and early evening hours when the atmosphere is either warming up or cooling off, the temperature inversions will contribute to tropospheric propagation are more frequently present. Tropospheric signals are practically always accompanied by a fading of some sort and trop DX'ing uncovers some of the weakest signals a TV/DXer will encounter. By the same token trop signals can be very steady and quite strong even over long distances. Unlike meteor scatter and Es skip there is no minimum distance for trop, no point is too close. Trop stations begin just beyond your regular fringe stations and extend upon occasions as far as 800 or more miles.

TV-DX for the month of April should see some rise on the trop scene with the return of warmer weather. Meteor scatter should be good with the LYrids shower scheduled for this month. In the more southern regions Es skip may begin to show up with some spotty openings. Aurora will be on the upswing this month but it is always difficult to identify DX by aurora.

With the return in the next several weeks of good DX'ing times (we hope) some who have felt that the ole one-eyed monster was not operating up to par should give a good look at the tubes in your set, alignment, condition of your antenna system, etc. The first tube in your TV set often determines the overall sensitivity of the entire set. It's a good idea to keep it in the best condition. Most cascade tuners use one of the following tubes in that important stage: 6BZ7, 6BQ7, 6BQ7A, or 6BK7. Of these all the tubes are interchangeable and the 6BZ7 will have the highest gain and best noise figure followed by the 6BQ7A. Lately I hear news of another direct plug-in replacement, the Amperex 6922, which has still higher gain and lower noise. It is not widely available but is well worth trying if you can get one.

This brings this month's column close to the end. Next month I expect I shall have more than one stencil and more material to fill in. Please keep the reports and on personal mail, I am answering slowly but surely, as always - hi.

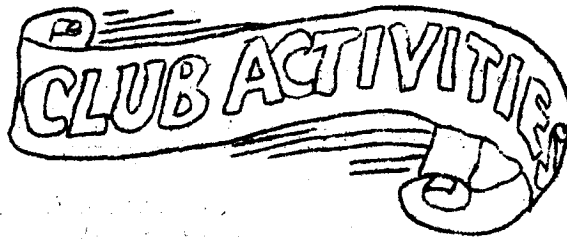
