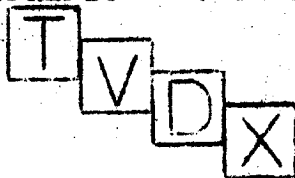

This is the progressive path leading us to higher goals. When something is accomplished, one feels that deep satisfaction on the inside. Man sets another goal, reaching out into space constantly striving to uncover the mysteries that the unknown contains.

New Tropospheric Scatter System Dish-like antennas at "over-the-horizon" site at Florida City, Fla. are aimed at Nassau in the Bahamas. New system will carry 24 simultaneous telephone conversations. New link is joint undertaking of long lines Dept. of American Telephone and Telegraph Co. and the Telecommunications Dept. of the Bahamas Government.

Much has been written by magazines and newspapers in their editorials, about space, and the many new inventions.

Electronic Industries Magazine, March 1960, writes some very interesting articles. One is "Space Detectives," in this 36 foot long tunnel at Sperry Gyroscope Company, engineers the behavior of infra red radiation. Walls of the tunnel are blackend to control back ground radiation. Facilities allow the researcher to investigate IR under atmospheres which exist on other planets in the solar system--Venus or Mars for instance.

Another article by this same magazine tells about a button size tunnel diode that takes the place of conventional amplifier. It is possible to use this diode in a small case the size of a wrist watch. This is just a few highlights from articles in this magazine. It is sent to the engineering laboratories of Transformer Manufacturing Co. of Chicago each month.

The future wall paneling is still another discovery called "Cold Light". which can illuminate an entire room at 60 cycles, 120 volts. The light can be increased at higher cycles, 200 cycles or more, just for a few pennies a day. Probaly this is exactly what T V D' Xers need for their T V D'X den. This cold light is not a bright light, but will produce enough light, so you can see around the room. Mothers (Fathers too) will welcome this new paneling for their nursery room.

Now a few words for UHF. UHF does have a future. Some feel that UHF is on the way out, others have differnt view points. Not long ago I received a verification from Mr. Robert Cleveland, Chief Engineer of WEHT TV Channel 50, Evansville, Ind. statint the following: This is to confirm your DX report. What kind of gear did you use? UHF is the superior type of television for the future, or the experienced.

With all the research that is going on at the present. UHF may prove to be superior above the channels now in use. A 1000 megacycles or more. Who knows?

CROWING SWING TO UHF * TV SEEN -- It now appears as if Washington is reconciled to the fact that TV will have to move upstairs to get more air space. Commenting on this prospect, FCC Commissioner Frederick Ford told the Senate Interstate Commerce Committee that the chances of getting more VHF space from the military are slim and that, accordingly, the ultra-highs seem to be the only solution. Industry has also indicated that such a move is in the offing and preparations for a palatable transition should be made as soon as possible. This may mean an improvement in the TV receiver. I hope so. Hi.

SHORTER*SPACED TV ASSIGNMENTS SUGGESTED -- The Commission is now reviewing criteria and requirements for shorter co-channel separations. Under the proposals, the FCC said it would consider short-spaced VHF assignments in a limited number of important TV markets. Selection of market area would be predicated on whether the need for additional service outweighs the need for any service lost as a result of interference to existing stations. Additionally, the Commission is considering a reduction of minimum adjacent channel separations from 60 to 40 miles.

NAVY FINDS VHF TRANSMISSION NOW POSSIBLE OVER ATMOSPHERIC DUCT--- There's an elevated transoceanic atmospheric duct, capable of trapping and propagation of waves at low loss over considerable distance, the Navy has discovered. The duct was found to have a thickness of approximately 500 feet, centered at a height of some 5000 feet, extending from West Africa to the coast of Brazil. Equipment operating at 220 mc. was used during tests to measure signal characteristics as a function of both distance and elevated heights, varying from sea level up through the elevated duct. With a power of only 100 watts, signals were detected all the way from Brazil to a point 1430 miles away.

Historical TV Facts & Figures:

During World War II, 6 TV stations were on the air, televising 2 or 3 hours a day. There were only about 5000 TV sets, most all in the Eastern United States.

In 1947 the F.C.C. authorized 13 channels between 54 and 216 megacycles Channel "one" was assigned to fixed and nobile services. By 1948, more than 300 applications had been received for stations, and almost a million sets were sold. In 1951, A.T. & T. inaugurated a microwave relay to California, thus coast-to-coast TV became a reality.

Verifications:

I have just seen some very fine veries recently received by Donald Ruland, of tropospheric receptions on the high channels. Some of the stations are out a thousand miles or better which makes these veries outstanding.

I was going to publish a sample copy of the type of letter which I send to a station when asking for a verification this month, but since I have something more important to discuss, I shall publish it in a later column. I am afraid that I offended some of the members last month, who takes photos of reception as proof of same. Perhaps I made it appear that letter veries are nicer than photos...letters are certainly not any nicer than photos! To you who follow the photographic angle may I say that you also have a very authentic proof of reception and something to really be proud to show anyone. One of the finest collections of verifications I ever saw was Carl F. Lupton's display of well over 100 photos here in 1956 at the AIPA convention.

One should not be discouraged if he sends for a verie and does not get a reply. Several years ago I sent 6 letters to channel six in Texarkana, Texas before I received a verie! Most all stations are glad to send a verie out for an authentic report. A self-addressed and stamped envelope for replies also helps. I am lucky to have a verie which I prize the most of all I have. It is from HIT, channel four in The Dominican Republic. Here is what happened: My dad sometimes picks up my mail at the local post-office. I had written to HIT-4 about receiving their signals and I kept waiting for a reply. After having almost given up hope of ever hearing from them, my brother came to my house and asked me if I had seen a peculiar looking card which my dad brought home with my name on it. I began to get curious and asked about it. No one knew where it was. I finally found it on a tree stump in my dad's yard where it had been for 3 days! I'm sure glad it didn't rain..hi! BUT IT IS KIND OF WEATHER BEATEN!! Hi!

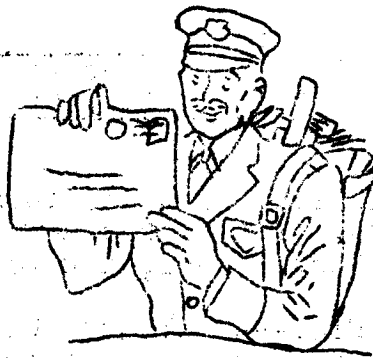

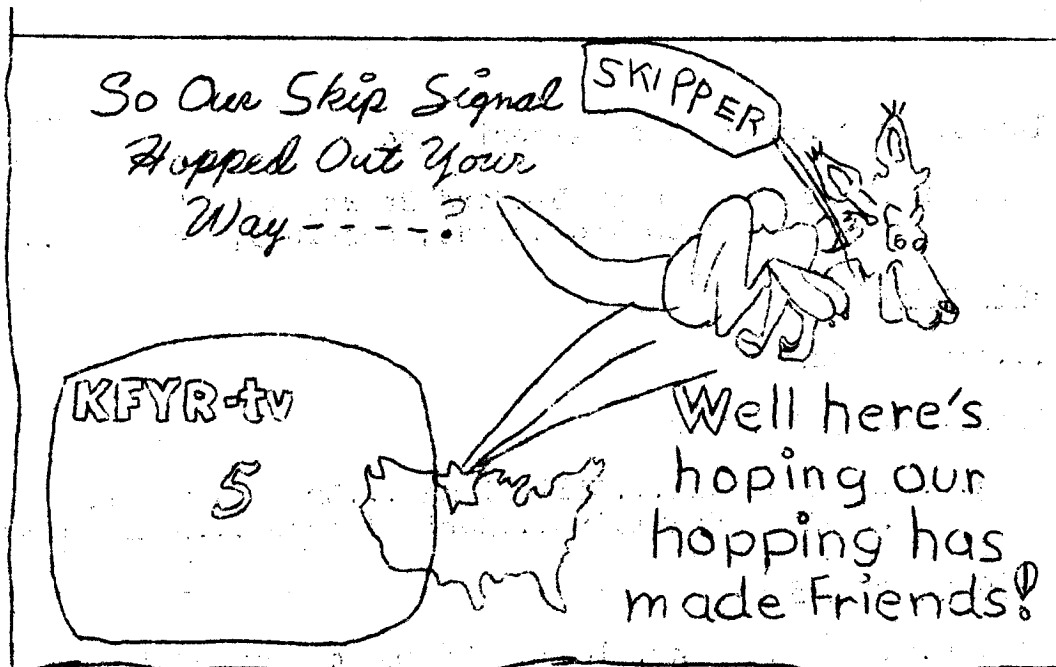
