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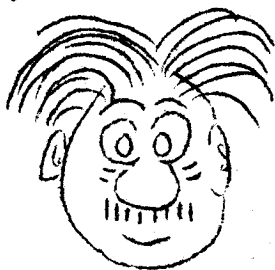
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The current controversy over the proper mode of DX mileage calculating, is indeed an unusual and perplexing problem. Unusual, because such a basic aspect of DX efforts has been taken for granted all these year (I presume) and as well perplexing, because there appears at this time to be no easy solution, if any, to the problem.

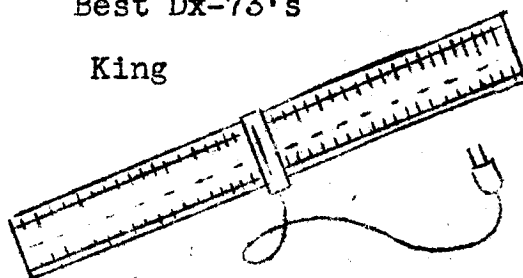
I believe I can be safe in saying, that all DX'ers when calculating mileage employ rather primitive methods. Name that small "mileage scale" found at the lower right-hand corner of most common design maps. With this handy aid, the DX'er proceeds with a ruler a piece of marked paper or a compass, to "chart" the distance between his area and WXYZ-TV. Now another DX'er seeing this amazing 980 mile haul, re-check's the reported mileage, and finds the "real" distance is 950 miles and not 980 miles. What happens after this is all too well known? A nasty exchange between individuals, one chap being a few more miles incorrect then the other.

The core of the problem thus hinges around reference points, or exact or semi-exact points to base your measurements upon. The ruler with one end on your home city, will thru you off balance from two to twenty or more miles before your even begin your determinations! Then when you cross the city of your logging, the actual location of the stations transmitter (if not known), could involve as much as 80 miles of error. So it is that no matter how trying your efforts are in this direction, unless more exact references are employed, the situation will remain for better or worse unchanged.

As we mentioned before there is no easy solution to this problem. I would refer you to last month's column of Gary Olson's. Here reference was made to the Oct. 1957 issue of the AIPA Bulletin. This edition has in fact the "answer" to our quest, a system of ascertaining exactly as to how far WXYZ-TV really is. So lets see, -our station is located in Detroit at latitude 42 degrees 28 feet 15 inches, and longitude of 83 degrees 15 feet and zero inches. Now obtain a copy of Professor Heimat Von Schlagenmorgens book "Rechnen und Mann" published by Tunichtquthaus in Vienna. Using your electric geometric slide-rule-well you know the rest, it's easy!

Welcome again to the pages of the AIPA bulletin-- as always, the Standards column is hot on the trail of some more conflicts.

The Case of Chicken and Counter-Chicken

In recent years a group of non-believers has arisen who consistently say, "I don't believe it--it's impossible that he could have gotten that station." This little clique of people includes just about everyone at one time or another. We have read about a North Carolina DXer who received several high band west coast stations; we have seen and met DXers who claim to have received stations thousands of miles away by "umpteenth-hop"; we have heard about people who say that they received stations which have been off the air for years.

Of course, some of these have been proved as hoaxes, but others still remain totally unexplained. We have to remember that DX in TV is freak and freak occurrences do take place-- the usual among freak reception is regarded however, by some as the golden rule. In other words, some people can't accept the fact that weird things can happen in TV DX and go totally unexplained.

At the AIPA convention two years ago, several DXers mentioned to me that it seemed impossible that Double-Hop skip could be received in the midwest. I myself was in sincere agreement with this, since I had never heard of any exceptions.

A few weeks ago, I received an almost positive reception of WAPA ch.4 in San Juan, Puerto Rico. Double hop--yes, the distance is right ---but, will everyone accept it? I received Spanish audio mentioning San Juan several times; I received on the hour "cuatro en San Juan", which is translated /as "four in San Juan". The offsets also checked positively. But still, there are some who will say that I must be wrong.

The problem concerning the "impossible" reception is that a new breed of DXers has arisen---the "chicken" breed, who are afraid to report what they actually saw. One DXer, it has been reported, received a high band IS burst from one of our southern states; he doesn't want to report it for fear of becoming placed in the focus of attention as a liar.

To combat this, the "counter-chicken" breed must arise. We should all try to fit into this category. To deny reporting an unusual logging is to deny yourself of due credit and also prevent us from uncovering new modes of propagation. To deny reporting is to deny progress.

Of course, if we aren't sure of the logging, we might as well not report it, or list it as tentative in big black letters. And if we are true liars, we don't belong in the AIPA, which is an organization dedicated to what we really see or hear and not what we can make up out of our heads.

There is a place for the DXer who claimed to receive KLEE TV after it was off the air. There is a place for the ex-AIPAer who lied about receiving ch.11 in Alaska and ch.13 in Los Angeles. Yes, there are places for DXers who are not DXers but frauds---but not in the AIPA.

MORAL-- AIPAers should be of the "counter-chicken" species at all times when they know that they definitely and positively received a station.

INTERNATIONAL NEWS
6 Sept., 1962

I got out of basic training at Fort Knox August 24, but I'm stationed there for another 8 weeks beginning 7 September. My electronics schooling didn't do me much good because they are sending me to cook's school. Right now I'm home on leave; on the way home I stopped at the Louisville public library to catch up on my reading and look for some news for this column.

While I was down there I had hoped to visit the La Grange boys but it never came off. I'm hoping I can make it sometime during the coming 8 weeks altho I've heard we won't get a pass until our 7th week.

One of the fellows at the Fort gets a newspaper from his home town regularly, and it appears that they have a new TV station there. Lima, Peru previously had channels 4, 9 and 13, but now programs are also listed for a ch. 2 station.

I suppose most of you are better informed on the "Telstar" satellite than I am, so I won't go into it here. Newspapers take up quite a bit of our Army pay so very few people can afford them.

Paper work is now going ahead on the BBC-TV UHF network which is supposed to be in operation by mid-1964 according to one report. It will use the CCIR 625 line standards and some color will be telecast. There is still speculation if and when the ITA will get a UHF network, and more speculation about the possibility of dropping VHF entirely when the UHF networks are well established. This would certainly be a blow to us IDKers over here but there's nothing we can do about it.

NBC has offered free news and public affairs programs for 2 years to all countries just starting in TV. Countries mentioned are: Uganda, Kenya, Tanganyika, Sierra Leone, (all in Africa), and Jamaica, Gibraltar and Aden. All are British possessions or former British colonies.

The German UHF network which began on a limited basis some time ago is temporarily suspended. They are still bickering over the ownership. The federal post office built the network but this was declared unconstitutional as I recall. Now the state governments and the VHF regional networks are fighting over it. Everyone wants a hand in it because it will be entirely commercial. The VHF system is mostly subsidized and income is inadequate. All-commercial TV would give the owner real income, maybe even too much as is the case of the ITV in Britain.

Switzerland now has 25 stations on the air, and more planned. The 25 are broken down as follows: 12 German, 8 French, 5 Italian.

In Canada, there is some news of new stations: Chicoutimi, Que., new independent French station, ch. 6, 68 kw, 431 aat. Carlyle Lake, Sask.; CKOS-TV2; ch. 7, 92 kw. Trois Rivieres, Que., CKTM-13, up to 162.5 kw from a 1323' tower.

That's all I found in "Broadcasting" magazine before the library closed but I believe that's just about all of it.

Locally, I learned that Gene Posner sold his 51% of WXIX-TV for a token \$1 to the Sampsons who already owned 49%. The Sampson group owns a chain of appliance stores in Milwaukee, including the one where I bought my first used TV set for exclusive DXing.

Posner was in broadcasting here for many years, being a founder of WCAN-25, and what is now WMIL-radio. WCAN-TV was one of the most successful of the early UHF stations in 1953, until CBS came to town and merged it with WOKY-19. Milwaukee had been a very hot UHF market until the original WXIX appeared, but that put UHF on the skids in my opinion, and it shows no signs of recovery. Perhaps educational WMVT-36 will help, but the new all-channel receiver legislation isn't likely to help very much until such time as all Milw. stations go UHF, and VHF is dropped. 73's.

He has been working at KHFR(FM) Monterey as an announcer (and he sounds good here in Wasco), so has not had a lot of time to DX. ALPA, September 1962 WESTERN DX, continued Dennis Smith, Wasco, California

Here in Wasco, California, yours truly's log doesn't look like much, but here it is. Es has been scarce, and I may have missed what little there was by being away from home at times. July 27: Es, unIDs. July 28: Ch. 77 Porterville, Calif. (new--40 mi. This is a new translator station for KLYD-17 Bakersfield, located on a high hill $2\frac{1}{2}$ mi. NNW of Porterville, with 1000 watts ERP. I'll find out call letters for next time. Reception--poor to fair video, clear audio). Aug. 3: Es, unID Spanish station, ch. 4 (see CCI Column for details). One new station brings the log up to 116. Your editor had a chance to observe TV- and FM-DX in a couple of mountain locations in the nearby Sierra Nevada mountain range. One place was Camp Sierra, about 50 miles NE of Fresno, at 4800 feet above sea level, and the other was Sequoia Crest, 40 miles east of Visalia, at 6900 feet elevation. My equipment consisted of my Hallicrafters SA-43 radio receiver, a recently purchased Blonder-Tongue BTU-2S UHF Converter, and a rabbit ears antenna. With this, I could receive FM broadcast stations with ch. 6 audio, and UHF TV audio. (Have you ever tried a ch. 5-6 IF UHF converter with an FM set?... It works!) Sequoia Crest was better than Camp Sierra, but neither was "ideal," in that there were some mountains that kept signals down. Camp Sierra is in a canyon, with the "open" end to the west being a 5500-foot mountain 10 miles away. You saw the results of FM-DX from there in the August FM-DX Column; I could also hear the audio of KSBY-6 at 145 mi., fair, and on UHF, audio of Fresno xmters KFRE-30 and KJEO-47 at 15 mi., clearly, and KMJ-24, over a 6000-foot mountain at 30 mi., weak. KCBW-8 Salinas, KNTV-11 San Jose, and San Fran. xmters were probably there, if I had equipment to receive them. Sequoia Crest is more in the clear, but mountains to the north and south made mountain xmters ghosty on the rabbit ears; however, there was visual line of sight to several other points. You will see the results of FM from there in the October FM-DX Column--and on TV audio, KSBY-6 at 130 mi. was very strong and clear, and comparing to the FM reception, I expect that KCBW-8 AND KNTV-11 were also strong, and signals from San Francisco TV. On UHF, the following stations were of fair strength but quite ghosty because of mountains in between: KICU-43 Visalia 35 mi., KBAK-29 & KLYD-17 Bakersfield 50 & 55 mi., KMJ-24 KFRE-30 & KJEO-47 Fresno 60, 75 & 75 mi, all with hill or mountain xmters in the same range in which I was DXing. Also, ch. 77 Porterville at 25 mi. was weak. Two UHFers were clear and strong, because their xmters are not up in the mountains: KDAS-21 Hanford at 55 mi. and KAIL-53 Fresno at 75 mi. Camp Sierra reception was July 11-18; Sequoia Crest Sept. 1.

A new station is scheduled to start programming on Sept. 15--KMEX ch. 34 Los Angeles. It will be an all-Spanish station, with programs by film and tape from Tolemstema headquarters in Mexico City. The owners are not worried about the lack of previous commercial UHF operations in Los Angeles, because they feel they have something to offer a specialized audience, and Los Angeles has a sizeable Spanish-speaking population. Xmtr will be on Mt. Wilson, and ERP will be 101 kw.

Any of us who have tape recorders know the pleasure of corresponding by tape, and many ALPAers know that this brings us closer together. I have a recorder, and tape to such DXers as-- B.J. Bingham, who always has interesting news of his and others' DXing activities; Bill Hauser, with his interesting activities in DX; Dave Crockett, with his varied news and enjoyable music; our president Art Collins, whose different kinds of music are well received; and Eric Norberg, who is able to use the professional facilities of KSPC (FM) Pomona College in making his tapes. I have also taped in the past to Dee Johnson, Ed Hepp, Walter Spaulding, Morris Foote, Tom Hidley Bill Hider, Allan Preston, Ferdinand Dombrowski, Phil Jacobs, & Bryan Rawlings. B.J. tapes to many DXers; my list is small compared to the boys B.J. corresponds with, both by letter and tape.

It appears that after I graduate from college this coming June, I will be joining your DX editor in Uncle Sam's club--either the Army or Navy--so I probably won't be able to continue with the Western DX Column after that. I would like to hear from any of you westerners who might like to take over the column sometime between now and May.

To any of you who have been waiting--and wondering--I have been informed that the #4 issue (1962) of Jones Listings for radio & TV will finally be ready September.

I will be off to college in mid-September; address still indefinite, so mail reports to Wasco address; they will be forwarded.

1. Friday, August 3, 8:05 to (9:30pm, ch.4 Es, probably from Mexico. The offset appeared to be zero offset, as the Spanish-speaking station was only 600 cycles off local KRCA (zero offset)'s video beat-or in musical terms, the 2nd E-flat above middle C on the piano. It did not waver at all. Program material was as follows:
8:05pm: a piano playing march-type music, and every few minutes or so, some children would yell something as if cheering, like a cheering section, and it sounded like the same phrase each time they yelled. Every several minutes, a woman announced something. All this (with the piano going constantly) continued until 8:28, at which time there appeared to be an ID, which consisted of the slide accompanied by singers probably singing the call letters. Following this was a commercial to 8:31pm, when another program started. This sort of daytime drama type or serial program was either live or on video tape, not film. Several commercials during this half-hour program included a toothpaste ad at 8:36, an add 8:44 and 8:45 (for Con Lavanda), and an add at 8:53pm. The show finished with credits at 8:57, then came add at 8:57, one for Pepsi (hits the spot jingle) 8:58, another for Alka Seltzer, then Nescafe 8:59pm, & others 7/73s Ad Ed
