(Tidbits cont.) Normal range is often to 300 miles. This is the first season at this location, so I hope to be able to receive stations never before possible. There are 3 local stations, two of them 100kw. Adjacent reception is possible on any of them if there is any reasonable signal strength. The most difficult, of course, is the class A 92.7 next to local 92.5 100kw. It's out at about 130 miles in about the opposite direction. I have heard it several times. Another interesting thing about the antenna is its ability to pick up a 104.9 Springdale when 104.9 Carthage is on the air. Carthage is less than 20 miles from my location. This is only a sometimes thing, but incredible. Thanks for your continued info on FM changes."

It's good to have Bruce Metzner (7435 N. Ashland-Chicago, IL 60626) back in the club. He writes, "My living situation is going to be indefinite for much of 1979. I'm currently in a condo rental and may remain there until late summer. In any event, when we get a little snow-melt on the roof I'd like to slap a CM Super-Crossfire up on the mast and raise the set-up by 10' over what I have currently: a paltry 35' or so above ground. WTFDA TV STATION GUIDE UPDATE... The ups and downs of the progress of this project if charted on paper would probably make a great design for a roller coaster. First delays were political, then a package of critical materal was reported as lost in the mail, so now what else could happen? Well, two of the our key reference sources, TV Factbook and Broadcasting Yearbook are late this year. The Factbook, originally planned for January release, might just make it out in early May. Because of all the time lost by past problems, we were confronted with going ahead with last year's data or delaying even longer until current data was available. We chose to accept the latter. To those members who have volunteered to help on the project or placed advance orders, please be patient a little longer. In the meantime, keep watching for news.

CODED TV CAPTIONS COMING BY '80... Long talked about, the use of line 21 for TV captions for the deaf is about to happen. HEW just announced that NBC and ABE will participate in a program to deliver about 15 hours of captioned programming per week. When viewed on a TV set connected to a special decoder, the captions appear at the bottom of the screen. The decoders are expected to cost about \$250 and will be sold by Sears.

FM BEAM BOX A BUST FOR DX... In a recent product test, <u>Stereo Review</u> said the BIC FM-8 "Beam Box" is a low gain but convenient indoor FM antenna. According to the report, "In every case, the Beam Box delivered less signal strength than an optimally oriented dipole. The average difference between the FM 8 and the dipole was 13.6 dB, varying from 8 dB with some stations at the upper end of the FM band to as much as 22 dB near the lower end." The Beam Box FM 8 sells for \$50.

MORE YCR NEWS... While rumors persist of an upcoming new breed of YCR, the old breed continues to be perfected. Sanyo announced that they have developed a 4-1/2 hour Beta YCR, topping the 4 hour maximum on YHS machines. Quality was said to at least equal existing 3 hour Beta machines, but with new added features. Soon after Sanyo's announcement, Sony and Toshiba also announced that they would offer a similar machines. The Sony YCR is expected to offer such features as four forward speeds (including slow motion) and even a reverse play position. The Sony and Toshiba YCRs will be awailable in programmable versions, similar to the YHS programmables... An interesting side note, Sony is now manufacturing video cassettes in Dothan Alabama and exporting them to Japan... Who sells the most YCRs? By brand it's Sony according to a recent research study, but more YHS units are sold than Beta YCRs... The trade papers and newsletters are always buzzing with rumors about totally new video recorder concepts. Most of these concepts never turn into practical consumer items, so we continue to report news of the leading contenders only.

WHAT'S AHEAD FOR THE DX SEASON? No one really knows for sure, but let's hope that the '79 Es season is better than that of '78. Right now you can improve your chances of success however, by sending a SASE to WTFDA headquarters for a copy of the new reprint catalog. Once you receive it, you'll be able to order articles on everything from how to build an indoor DX antenna to how to ID a mystery logging. Order a copy today!

BITS... Blonder-Tongue has just announced a new 53-page catalog covering many products of interest to TV and FM DXers. The new catalog features antennas, preamps, traps and other accessories. It's free from Blonder-Tongue Labs, Inc., One Jake Brown Road, Old Bridge, New Jersey 08857... Bob Cooper's how-to article on satellite signal reception is now scheduled to begin in a summer or fall issue of Radio-Electronics. It will be a multipart article of considerable detail... This summer Davis Publications (Elementary Electronics) will offer a new annual called Radio Experimenter 1979. According to the publisher, the publication will cover "the entire spectrum of radio-oriented hobby activities" including scanners, and FM and TV DXing... If you are bugged by TV signal images on your 30 to 50 MHz receiver, try adding a ham radio low-pass filter between your receiver and antenna. The filter should be one designed to pass signals up to 54MHz. These filters are intended to be used with a transmitter to reduce harmonics which cause TVI, but also effectively reduce received interference from signals above 54 MHz.



AFRTS ALASKA UPDATE

The new Alaskan Forces Satellite Television Network is presently in the final stages of completion. The former system had the U.S. Air Force operating three independent TV stations, and the Navy operating another. In August 1978 the U.S. Department of Defense, Armed Forces Information Service gave approval for the Satellite Network. The final result will be the converting of the three Air-Force operated stations to unmanned TV Repeater sites. These sites will be fed by satellite from the new network headquarters at Elmendorf Air Force Base near Anchorage. Also scheduled for inclusion in the network is the Navy-operated facility at Adak.



The installations served by the present system, and scheduled for the satellite system are the Naval Station at Adak; Galena Airport (including Campion Air Force station); King Salmon Air Force Station*; and Shemya Air Force Base (including Attu Coast Guard Loran Station).

* The Bristol Bay villages of Dillingham, Naknek, Aleknagik, Manokatak, Levelock, Kohiganek &New Stuvahok receive the King Salmon TV Signal thru a series of 10-watt translators funded by the state of Alaska. Department of Defense approval was obtained thru Congressional Delegation. (continued on page 20)

FCC-TV NEWS APRIL 1979

A TV GUIDE ARTICLE published recently which dealt with new television technology, gave a paragraph to circular polarization (CP). The article states that "at least one station is currently switching to CP" in Chicago, Indianapolis, Miami, Raleigh, and San Diego. We all know about WLS-7 Chicago and WRAL-5 Raleigh, but which stations in the other three cities are going CP? The article didn't even mention Florence SC where WBTW-13 will soon switch to CP. Anyone having any information on "CP CPs" (hi-hi) should notify FCC-TV as soon as possible.

BUFFALO's WEATHER, which turned out to be among the worst in history this past winter, took its toll on area TV stations. The most interesting report is on WGR-2, where severe icing on its microwave relay dish forced cancelled regular programming until chief engineer Dick Westlund blasted the ice off the dish--with a .22-caliber rifle!! WKBW-7 had some hassles too, with a bad transmission line leak. But some of the worst luck fell upon the Chautauqua County ETV translator system. W46AB and W26AA, both powerful 1000-watters, were both destroyed by the severe storms, and many smaller translators, who depend upon W46AB for their feed, have been forced off-the-air. It's not nice to fool with Mother Nature!!

TROUBLE IN LOUISVILLE didn't involve severe weather, but fire, A lightning strike destroyed the transmitter of WLKY-32, the local ABC affiliate. Any equipment not destroyed by the resulting fire was ruined by water damage. According to an ABC News report on the blaze, it is unknown when the

station will be able to return to the air. OUT ON LONG ISLAND the temporary off-air hiatus of WLIW-21 Garden City was due to moving their transmitter to a new site about 10 miles ENE of the old one. The PBS affiliate, like many others, is now equipped for satellite reception of network service, and has their first studio! (They reportedly used to do the news from the control room!)

SECA stands for Southern Educational Communications Association, and the 16-state region served by SECA seems to be "where it's happening" for new PBS stations. Plans call for activation of the following stations during 1979: WKOH-19 Owensboro KY, WKPD-29 Paducah KY, KMOS-6 Sedalia MO, Ch. 60 Harlingen TX, Ch.62 Frederick MD, Ch.36 Oakland MD, KLTL-24 Lafayette LA, Ch.30 Fort Myers FL, Ch.18 Lake Charles LA, and Ch. 19 Jacksonville NC. In the planning stages for 1980-81 are: Ch. 25 Alexandria LA, Ch.23 Conway SC, Ch. 49 Spartanburg SC, Ch.38 Greenwood SC, Ch. 11 Houma LA, Ch.44 Aiken SC, and Ch. 17 Orangeburg SC. SECA also reports KLRU-18 Austin TX as onair, though there has been no official word of this. More new DX targets and, alas, more UHF congestion! CHANNEL 13 IN TACOMA, Washington is a commercial allocation. KCPQ-13, the

station presently occupying the channel, is operating educationally. The Clove Park School Board's plan to sell the station to a commercial group has aroused the ire of a sizeable group of local residents that want to keep a PBS station on-the-air. The group is petitioning the FCC to switch Tacoma's educational reservation from Ch. 56 to Ch. 13.

THE CHRISTIAN BROADCASTING NETWORK has negociated an agreement with KTLA-5, an L.A. independant, whereby CBN will supply the station with a 10-meter satellite dish for live distribution of CBN programming. The dish will also be utilized as the feed point of an extensive microwave system which

will relay CBN through much of southern California.

WILL ABC BE SATISFIED WITH ITS "KILL"? Yes, says Robert F. Fountain, vicepresident in charge of station relations. He feels that ABC will not continue "to attract or be interested in as many new affiliates in the next three years as in the past three." Says Fountain, "we're at parity

"SUPER-STATION" STRIKES AGAIN!! A November Arbitron survey gives WTCG-17 only 36,100 homes in its home Atlanta market, but a whopping total of 2,079,000 homes including its satellite audience. I wonder if that total includes Cooper....

STLs ON UHF?? A petition by Mosely Associates, Inc., a communication equipment manufacturer, calls for the use of vacant UHF channels on a secondary, non-interfering basis for aural STLs and inter-city relays. The Association of Maximum Service Telecasters (AMST) is one of many groups crying "Foul!" and declaring the proposal as "not feasible." If the plan were approved, it could mean many new and intersting DX targets, as anything transmitting in the VHF-UHF spectrum is fair game!





For my initial column, I would like to introduce myself and make some comments concerning how this column will be handled. I am a communications engineer working primarily with telephone and some CATV. I have been a TV DX'er since 1963 and have been a member of the WTFDA since its inception. I DX from two locations, Des Lacs and Fargo, ND. Most of my better loggings were made from Des Lacs where I have better equipment, and where I grew up. I don't spend much time there now, so my Fargo log is starting to grow.

The reporting standard for TV columns requires the three column format,

The reporting standard for TV columns requires the three column format, and I would appreciate reports being submitted in that format. I would like to encourage you to calculate or measure distances for your loggings and include them in your report. These distances make it much easier for DX'ers in other parts of the country to get a feel for how good the conditions were.

When compiling your reports, please keep in mind that this is a DX column, and only unusual reception should be reported. I don't intend to establish any mileage minimums for DX since only you, the DX'er, knows what is DX for your location and for your receiving equipment. Be selective in reporting. A station seen even 10 per cent of the time should probably not be regarded as a DX station. However, reports listing new loggings at any distance and changes or unusual operation of your local stations are certainly proper. If you do want to indicate enhanced conditions from some nearby stations, list the loggings by city without a list of all the individual stations seen.

Reports of unids and tentatives are welcome in order to provide more data about openings. However, long lists of unids are probably of little value. Just list the time, direction, and channels effected if no ID's were made. When you have enough data to make an ID possible, you should report it to the CCI column. Reports of the MUF's observed will be published.

I am looking forward to receiving many reports from western DX'ers and I would appreciate any comments you may have on the column.

A word about the New Zealand audio - it is a wide-band (high deviation) form of FM and thus very difficult to render on an am/ssb/n.b.f.m. receiver. When running a single test tone, the sidebands make it sound like a multiplex (multiple carrier) signal. Normal programming audio spreads out to 50 kHz or so. Unmodulated carriers are about the only time one can tell if one, two, or all three off-sets are in.

Roger Bunney has supplied off-set info for various European stations and I hope to run that in a few months, in time for the fall season.

IN SEARCH OF PSB....Marine Radio Service. The frequency range 156.275-157.425 & 161.80 - 162.00 is designated for use by the Marine Radio Service, and put to use by vessels of all sizes throughout the navagatable waters of the United States and Canada. Universally 156.800 (channel 16) is the calling and distress; meaning contact must be made on this channel and another channel selected for the actual communication is supposed to take place on another frequency, but you tune into 16 on a Saturday or Sunday afternoon and see if this takes place.

The number of channels assigned are necessary especially from late May until Mid September when pleasure craft jam the airwaves. Spring and Summer tropopheric probagation tend to further aggravate the congestion making long distance communications just about impossible.

The frequency range 161.80 - 162.00 also provide interesting listening as they are the marine coastal station(marine telephone) stations that dot the coastal areas of navagatable waterways.

Welcome to the first edition that TV Statistics has appeared in over a period of three years. Here is a chance for you to submit your TV DX totals as you do for FM DX to the FM Statistics column. I have many great plans for this column; but they will never be realized unless I have your support. In the past I have noticed this column to be a very popular one, with as many as 50 reporters contributing. Initially I would be very happy for 50 people to report to this column; but my goals are even greater. That's right. In the future I can see the time when ½ of the total membership will be reporting. Yes, it will mean alot of work for me; but I know that I can handle it. W.T.F.D.A. has been a way of life for me for the past three years as part of the publishing crew and manager of the Reprint Service. Now as I embark with my first edition of TV Statistics it is my hope that the club membership will report and continue to make the VUD one of the best DX publications in North America.

I will begin by adopted the rules that the previous editors have used for calculating station totals. The following are the set of rules that will be used unless some other suggestions are submitted to me:

- 1. A TV station received on more than one channel (when it changes channels, but retains its identity) may be counted once for each channel. This excludes changes in offeset on a single channel. Simultaneous reception of a station on more than one channel is virtually always a receiver problem only, but you may present evidence to the contrary.
- 2. Stations operating successively on the same channel in the same city which are clearly unrelated may be counted as seperate stations.
- 3. Changes in power of the transmitting stations does not make the station eligible to be counted as a seperate station.
- 4. A change in call letters does not necesarrily indicate that a different station has been received, thus a change in call letters does not make the station eligible to be counted as a seperate station.
- 5. The precise location of the transmitting tower will be the determining factor when measuring distance totals and figuring Total Political Units (TPU).
- 6. A move in the station's transmitting tower does not make the station eligible to be counted as a seperate station unless the city of license changes also. This also holds true when measuring distance totals unless the transmitting tower moves a distance of 25 miles.
- 7. Sharetime stations are only counted once when computing station totals unless they have seperate transmitter locations.
- 8. Any station licensed by the FCC to broadcast is eligible to be computed in your totals. This includes experimental stations and translators. Harmonic radiation of visual signals are eligible if they fall within the legal TV band.
- 9. DX received via CATV is eligible to be counted as long as the station was picked up off the air on its original frequency at the CATV headend, from which the distance must be measured. However the totals received via CATV must be specified as so.
- 10. Verification is not required. You must be reasonably sure that you received the station in question. From time to time I will make spot checks to insure the accuracy of your reports. This will be done to insure fairness and honesty in reporting to this column.
- 11. DX received by recording devices is permissable as long as the DXer himself sets up the recording devices. (Example: It is permissable to set up your Tape recorder or VTR ahead of time when you are not able to actually witness the DX.)
