PHILLY'S OWN SUPER STATION!

WWSG-TV is now a thing of the past. From what I could gather, its pay-TV service, PRISM, is now carried by an MDS system. PRISM is a Philadelphia-oriented sports & movie ("SM") service which had been unavailable to the city itself because of lack of cable companies. A full-service broadcast station is a little too much to cover just the city, which is why PRISM probably went to an MDS system. Meanwhile, from the Philadelphia Inquirer from 10/18/1985: "After months of speculation on the part of local TV industry observers and official silence from the station itself. Philadelphia's newest independent will begin with 24-hour music videos, then outlet, WGBS-TV, Channel 57, has released its programming schedule, and it's a doozy. The station, which begins operation on Sunday at 7:00 a.m. (10/20/1985 - wbf), has a line-up that is sure to delight fans of classic television. There's no doubt Miami-based Grant Broadcasting..., which purchased 57 earlier this year, has spared no expense in putting together its programming fare. Like all independent stations. 57's programming leans heavily towards 'nostalgia' programming. But the station has compiled a roster of old shows air since last March because its antenna which amounts to 'Rerun Heaven' for video buffs." Programs scheduled include some current talk-show and information programs. WGBS also carries the Philadelphia Flyers and college basketball games, apparently as an

incentive for cable companies, now free from the "must-carry" rules, to carry the station. In fact, the President of the Philadelphia Flyers sent letters to all of the subscribers of cable companies not yet planning to carry WGBS. urging them to ask the company to carry the station. Movies are restricted to weekends. Weekdays are entirely syndicated programs.

Marty Barvinchak confirms that WKBS, ch. 47 in Altoona, PA, is on the air. He saw them testing 10/19. On 10/20 they were broadcasting the same programs as WPCB. ch. 40 in Greensburg, PA. In the Pittsburgh area. WQED-13 and KDKA-2 have no plans to go stereo. but WPXI-11 and WTAE-4 hope to have stereo soon. He hopes I can get a list of stereo TV stations. I hope to in the future. but right now the number of stereo TV stations is over a hundred and still climbing rapidly, and the amount of stereo programming is still quite small, so it would be best to wait until the industry levels off a little before a complete list is attempted.

Randy Miltier sent a clipping from the 11/6 San Jose Mercury News. It seems that a local resident is complaining about the use of strobe lights by KCRA-3 and KTXL-40 on their transmitter towers instead of the old red warning lights. He says it makes the area look like Las Vegas.

Another letter from Marty sent a few news articles. The 10/8/85 Pittsburgh Press reported that a LPTV station on ch. 63 plans to go on the air on January 1, 1986. "A McMurray woman has purchased the license for the lowpower TV signal allocated to this area by the Federal Communications Commission... Jan. 1 is the target date for operation of Channel 63 under the call letters WBON-TV." As we all know by now, and as the press obviously has yet to find out, you don't get TV licenses like CB licenses. You get them the way Smith Barney earns money, and I don't mean defrauding banks. You have to show that your facilities are up to standards and functioning correctly, then wait about half a year after you're already on the air. So whatever she purchased, it's not a license. Also, the FCC does not grant broadcast call letters to LPTV stations. So I don't know where those call letters came from. If the local cable TV companies don't carry ch. 63, the station later phase in local advertiser-supported programming. If it does get on the cable, it will start immediately with advertiser-suppor ted programming. The station will operate 100 watts TPO and transmit from atop Mount Washington, near Pittsburgh, PA.

From the 10/15/85 Pittsburgh Press: Metropolitan Pittsburgh Public Broadcasting is starting its periodic Begathon by going after the big guys first: the companies. It also mentioned that WQEX-16 has been off the failed. When its new transmitter gets installed, it will "not only have a stronger signal because it is new but will enable Channel 16 to broadcast in color for the first time. The station will return to the

air 'whenever this transmitter arrives and is line." That guy seems to pop up everywhere. set up. " Marty was informed by the station that the transmitter problem is not expected to be resolved before next spring.

John F. Zeis sent a clipping from the West Chester (PA) Daily. The Philadelphia Big Five (basketball) will be covered by WBOT-TV, channel 61. WBOT is a Wilmington station that plans to go on the air in early December. "WBOT president Dan Slapes said the station would be able to reach out in a 50-mile radius from Wilmington." That's quite a trick, when you consider that the transmitter is in Woodstown, NJ. When I last checked the site about two months ago, the proposed TL was still growing corn. I'll check soon to see if any 949' high towers sprouted there recently. John writes, "I saw an article indicating Philadelphia Ch. 35 will begin broadcasting as a secondary PBS service late this fall. Since their antenna coordinates are the same as ch. 57, 35 may be planning to use the transmitter 57 is in the process of replacing." Actually, there is a law somewhere that obligates commercial stations that own towers to allow educational stations to attach their transmitters on the tower for a reasonable fee.

John M. Jefferson wrote, "KCPM-40 Chico signed on 9/24/85, billing itself as the area's only 'superstation' and carrying NBC. So far they seem to have no local news, airing any government control over its program proreruns in the local-news time slots. The signal ranges from good to virtually nothing here, about 150 miles away, with lots of garbage in the way. Decidedly better than KHSL-12, which is frequently absent altogether & rarely is usable....Their xmitter is near Red Bluff, on Tuscan (Tustin) Buttes, former site of KALF 95.9 and soon-to-be site of KRBQ 102.7. That site is well situated to cover Redding as well as the Chico area." "KMSG-59 Sanger... They're 100% religious, contrary to a report that they were carrying rock video programs." On a network change, "KFSN-30 is now carrying ABC & KJEO-47 has CBS." He also reports that KRCB-22 Cotati actually began broadcasting 11/84, not 1/85, "KPST-66 Vallejo

is is currently hoping to be on in 4/86." W.R. McIntosh wrote that SelecTV (KWHY-22 in Los Angeles) had bought out ON-TV, which had been operating on KBSC-52 in nearby Corona. ON-TV subscribers had to change decoders to receive their service on KWHY. Meanwhile, KBSC was sold by Oak Media Corp. to Estrella Communications, which changed the call letters to KVEA, at which time the station went off the air temporarily. According to several sources, Estrella is a Spanish language outfit. Then a clipping from the 10/24/85 Los Angeles Times read, "KVEA-TV Channel 52 will begin proadcasting in Southern California on Nov. 24...reaching Los Angeles, San Bernardino, Riverside, Orange, Kern and Ventura counties." But another letter from Mc. dated 11/4, reads, "Starting on Sunday, 3 Nov 85, during the day, KVEA 52...came back on the air for daytime and evening hours. No mention of Estrella or any other program - just hours and hours of Gene Scott." "He must plan on being there awhile since he has set up local phone lines as well ashis 1-800 phone

I've seen him on several stations along the east coast in the past few months. He's the only preacher on television that preaches while slouched on a swivel chair, wearing a leather jacket and smoking on a cigar between sentences.

Other articles sent by W.R. McIntosh: Times Mirror, publisher of the Los Angeles Times, has agreed to sell three of its seven television stations to Smith Acquisition Corp. Evidently it has its eyes on television stations in more profitable markets. The Korean-American Free Press Committee, a group of Korean-Americans living in Los Angeles, filed a complaint with the FCC against KSCI-TV, ch. 18 in San Bernardino, CA. The station sells blocks of programming time to 13 different ethnic groups, who arrange their own sponsors and programming. 12 hours of the week is in Korean. The complaint charges the station with receiving most of its Korean programming from Korean Television Enterprises, which they claim is controlled by the South Korean Government. They also charge the station with knowingly concealing the South Korean government's involvement in its programming. The South Korean government and Korean Television deny any government control over KSCI's programming. Korean Television itself denies duction. The station claims that there have been no violations of FCC rules.

In another article, Rupert Murdoch is combining his recently acquired 20th Century Fox Film Corp. with the six Metromedia stations is purchasing. He plans to create a new division which will be called Fox Television Network. It will be late 1986 or early 1987 before any networking begins. The six TV stations he is acquiring cover 22% of the television audience in the country.

Another article confirms that the FCC approved the sale of KTLA-5 in Los Angeles to the Tribune Company, which in turn must sell the Daily News (Van Nuys, CA) within 18 months of the completion of the transfer. At \$510 million, this was the most expensive television station sale yet.

Meanwhil e. CBS, trying to defray part of the 31 billion it lost fighting Ted Turner's takeover attempt, announced that it will sell KMOX-TV in St. Louis, the least profitable of its five television stations.

This next article I saved for last so that I could give it special attention. It's about the current practice of some noncommercial educational television stations of selling air time to commercial advertisers for 30-second commercials. Firstly, let me say that they are doing it, and have been for quite some time now. Educational stations started out by merely acknowledging a contribution of a major corporation for the production of a particular program. Then they started showing the company's logo while announcing the blurb. Then the blurb was expanded to include a short plug for the company, even mentioning some of its products. Then I noticed that WLVT-39 in Allentown, PA, had been giving rather extensive and detailed plugs. Then New Jersey Network started showing 30-second commercials between programs between programs, which were not in any way connected with the program. The only thing was that somewhere in the commercial, a voice added, "a proud sponsor of New Jersey Network." Secondly, let me say that I don't object to commercial advertising on educational stations. It merely means fewer of my tax dollars are being wasted on The Uncle Floyd Show. But let us not deceive ourselves by calling them noncommercial stations. Limited-commercial stations, maybe. According to the 9/5/1985 Los Angeles Times. KCET, ch. 28 is doing the same thing. "For the last 10 months, KCET has been peppering its lineup with low-key 'messages' from program underwriters- 10-, 15- and 30-second spots that plug the sponsoring company and sometimes one of its products." "...these spots are occasionally popping up unconnected to any particular broadcast. What followed a rec ent telecast of 'The Wild, Wild World of Animals, for example, were three promotional spots for upcoming wildlife documentaries, then the voic e of an announceer who offered thanks for the support shown to KCET by subscribers and 'the following' company - after which a paid ad for Marineland appeared. The spot showed viewers what they could experience variety of radio and TV stations and microwave at the aquatic park, but stopped short of asking them to visit." "KCET is doing what many public-television stations across the country are doing: trying to bolster revenues with the lure of expanded on-air credit for their support." And don't forget, your commercials are tax-exempt. "In the past, corporations providing financial support to a particular program could only be identified on the air by having their name appear in block letters before and after the show. But in March, 1984, the FCC relaxed its rules on underwriter crediting...." "FCC guidelines restrict the nature of advertising that public-television staions can accept. The enhanced underwriting spots cannot interrupt programs and they cannot use hard-sell techniques-no hyperbole about the virtues of a product, no comparisons with other products, no solicitations to use the product." On the same page was another article. "New York - WNET, the nation's largest public television station, also is elling time between programs to corporations, but is

looking for a somewhat different type of message than KCET in Los Angeles. The spots on WNET are meant to endorse nonprofit enterprises - either public TV itself or another organization, such as a museum, zoo or arts facility." "Under WNET's policy...two minutes of air time between programs is (sic) available to corporations at a flat rate of 31,500 per 30 seconds, and to nonprofit organizations for \$1,000 for 30 seconds." "Air time already has been purchased by Chanel, Rolex watches, and the Museum of Modern Art, among others. The spots are not allowed to endorse a particular product, the station spokeswoman said. The policy allows a corporation to talk to our public, but not to give them a commer-

cial message, she said. Give them time. While we're redefining the word 'noncommercial. maybe we should take another look at the word, 'educational.' Just how educational are such programs as The Twilight Zone, Star Trek, The Fugitive, Alfred Hitchcock Presents, and Dark Shadows. And why do we consider everything pumped out of the BBC to be educational? Just what are we saying when we refer to a television station as being a noncommercial educational station? Let's get some input on that from club members!

Let me get on to Nate My. He sent an article from the 10/25/85 Isthmus. "By March 1. for the first time in 30 years, Madison (Wisconsin -wbf) will have a new commercial TV station. But whether it will appeal to local viewers and advertisers remains to be seen." The article mentions that, unlike the superstations WGN and WTBS, this independent station will be financially limited, and therefore will not be able to present as good quality programming. But another factor may soon play a part in helping the station. "The studio and offices will be on the former site of the Big-Sky Drive-In, and the 1,000-foot antenna will be on universityowned land a mile away. By late 1986, however, WMSN (ch. 47 in Madison -wbf) will join a carriers on a grandiose 'candleabra tower,' which, at 1,422 feet, will be southern Wisconsin's highest antenna. Once atop the Candleabra, local TV and radio stations will by attracting more companies to make donations be able to extend their reach to Rock County. Presently, the FCC and the national ratings companies assign that county to the Rockford Area of Dominant Influence. If enough Rock County homes tune in Madison stations (they already get the powerful WISC-TV, that area may be reassigned to the Madison ADI. Were that to happen, Madison would leap from the 104th-largest market to somewhere in the 90s, enabling local stations to increase ad rates and attract national advertisers that buy time only in the 'top 100' markets." "The more money a station makes, the better programming it can buy." And from an article in the 10/24 Wisconsin State Journal, "A temporary transmission tower is being constructed on the corner of Mineral Point Road and the West B eltline." "The station will have a relatively strong signal, reaching as far south as northern Illinois."

Nate sent me a card asking some questions relating to meteor scatter. Because of an almost total lack of club involvement on the subject, I ceased doing a regular column on meteor scatter. But occasionally I do get some imput, but not enough to do a regular column. For want of anything better, I decided to throw it in this column. Mate asks, What, if anything, does the arrival of Halley's Comet mean to DX propagation? Can we look forward to increased meteor scatter?" Probably not. In fact, I heard of a theory that the meteor showers associated with the comet should be no more dense than usual, and that astronomers hoped to prove that theory during the current visit by the comet. I don't know what their reasoning behind that

theory. "Will it have any impact on the 2 or F2 layers of the ionosphere?" I have often heard of something called "meteor scatter enhanced E-skip." but I question if there is such a thing. I have never read of it in any of the science magazines or journals, and I don't see how a few pinhead-sized meteors could cause a skip opening. I wonder sometimes if somebody is mistaking an unusually long overdense-distorted burst for a short skip opening. Robert Grant wrote several months ago about a large amount of meteor scatter on the nights of 2/14-19, 1985. He even checked the sky, and noticed several slow-moving meteors radiating from Canis Major. Meteors coming from that direction at that time of year would tend to be slower than average velocity, but there is no shower on record anywhere near that time, not even a small shower. I have been looking in the astronomy magazines for several months since then to see if anybody reported unusually large numbers of meteors at that time, but so far I have seen nothing.

Remember all those NBC affiliates that jumped ship before it sank and went over to ABC a few years ago. Larry Fuss sent this interesting article from the Atlanta Journal and Constitution, dated 10/11/85, "Other former NBC affilates may be returning to the folnow that the peacock network is leading the battle for network supremacy, but WSB/Channel 2 apparently plans on toughing it out with last-place ABC. A longtime NBC affiliate. Channel 2 dumped that network rather uncerimoniously in September 1980 and made the switch to ABC, which had ruled the Nielsens in the late '70s and still was a strong No. 2 at that time. NBC inherited former ABC affiliate WXIA/Channel 11. WSB was one of about 25 stations that jumped networks, primarily to ABC, during the 10 years NBC was mired in the ratings basement. In most cases, NBC ended up replacing its form er affili ate with a weaker station." "Recently, however, the trend has been the other way, with three of those former NBC affiliates deciding to return to the network, which moved up to second place in the ratings last season and is leading the pack so far this fall. Earlier this year, WSAV-TV in Savannah, which had dropped NBC in 1982, returned to the network. In the last couple of weeks. KOMU-TV in Columbia, Mo. (which dumped NBC in 1982). and KCEN-TV in Waco-Temple, Texas (a deserter last year), both have scrambled back aboard the NBC Bandwagon.

Paul Gaines sent in several television listings of recent stations to come on the air. For example, KMSS-TV, ch. 33, which signed on 10/6/1985 in Shreveport, LA, as that city's first independent station. It seems to be lacking in syndicated programs of any worth. Saturday's listing consisted of six movies during the day. Would you believe not one religious program at all on Sunday? Cartoons in the morning and six movies the rest of the day. Cartoons for two hours each weekday morning, followed by three hours of religious programs. Cartoons and children's shows in the afternoon, then back to a few syndies be-

fore we hit another movie. I hope they do better when they get themselves established. But in an area with nothing but network affiliat es. it's still a change. There is no news program of any kind on its schedule. Maybe in the future.

Paul reports that ch. 31 in Ann Arbor, MI (WIHT), is now SPN (or did you mean the Disney Channel, Payl?). W22AE in Bucyrus,

Ohio, is now running ON-TV.

<u>Ben Wilkie</u> asks, "Could you please furnish me with any information that you may have on a new translator for WLNE ch. 6 in New Bedford Ma. This operates on ch. 48. I have been receiving this station recently, as well as many other distant UHFers." I haven't done anything on LPTV or translators since the 1984 list. But if anybody else has any information. let me know. Ben also asked about WGOT, ch. 60 in Merrimack, NH. So far, I haven't heard a thing. They still have a CP. but I don't know when they would be coming on the air.

John Combs writes, "Ken Simon tells me that the Miami Herald ran an announcement in their TV section saving that they will not run schedules for Channel 36 in Cape Coral. This was apparently in answer to inquiries from readers, so it's very possible they are on the air." They did. about a week before you sent the letter. By the way, John, that envelope was a mess by the time it arrived. Cancellation marks all over it. It's a wonder the Post Office delivered it.

Richard Steinberger sent a series of articles about the transmitter tower for WVJV-TV, ch. 66 in Marlboro, MA. A few weeks before last Christmas, the station began testing the strobe lights on its 1249-foot tower on Parmenter Road. Neighbors in Hudson. Stow. and as far away as Westboro and Sterling, began comp laining about the lights. One area resident said it was lighting up his oak trees. On foggy nights, the entire sky lit up with the strobe's flashes. Hundreds of people complained to the police about the lights. The station finally decided to let the strobe lights stay on only during the

On another subject, WGBH-2, the first major Boston station to go fulltime stereo, plans to convert WGBX-44 to stereo later this year.

Paul Mount sent an article about WOR-TV, the New York station that everybody thinks is a New Jersey station. It's from the 11/6/85 Record (Bergen County?): "GenCorp, the... parent company of WOR-TV Channel 9 in Secaucus. put New Jersey's only commercial VHF television station on the selling block yesterday." "GenCorp, which faces federal challenges to more than a dozen of its broadcast licenses, also announced a preliminary agreement to sell its KHJ-TV Los Angeles television station to Westinghouse Broadcasting in New York...." "All (Gen Corp licenses -wbf) face FCC challenges except WOR-TV, which was granted a five-year license renewal under

special legislation granting a license to any VAF station which would move to New Jersey." know the full story behind that one. I also remember hearing word about Westinghouse studying the purchase of WOR-TV. If they do. they would have to sell MYW-TV, ch. 3 in Philadelphia, because of overlap of coverage area.

Rod O'Connor sent some news from Alaska. It looks like some of their stations are growing up. One article he sent reads. Local television station KTUU-TV (Channel 2) on Monday began sending 'full power' television signals from a new transmitter and tower at Goose Bay, located across Knik Arm from Anchorage. By broadcasting at 100,000 watts instead of the former 28.800 watta at a new location, reception will improve in Wasilla, Palmer, Eagle River and on the Kenai Peninsula." "Reception also will improve in areas of Anchorage where television signals previously were poor due to transmitter location Anchorage westward Hilton Hotel. KAKM (Channel 7), Anchorage's public television station will begin broadcasting from the new location at the end of the week, and KIMO (Channel 13) also will use the Goose Bay transmission tower." But while the signal is stronger in regions outside the city. reception in Anchorage is very disappointing. From the 10/29/85 Anchorage Daily News. "Signals from a new television tramsmission tower at Goose Bay are so weakened by their 12-mile journey that Anchorage viewers who have gotten along with 'rabbit ears' atop their TVs may now be stuck with snow on their screens as well as in their yards. After extensive tests, engineers for KTUU-TV Channel

2. the first station to start broadcasting from the 808-foot-tall antenna at the new Those of you who have been reading this column site, decided the reception is as good as it's going to get." "The transmission facilities at Goose Bay across th e Knik Arm are owned jointly by Channel 2, KAKK-TV Channel 7. KIMO-TV Channel 13 and the University of Alaska, which is planning a new instructional channel. KAKM started transmitting from the new location on Friday (10/25 -wbf). Engineers for the station are noticing reception anomalies similar to those documented by KTUU." "KTUU paid just over 31 million to move to the new location, including the station's share of the new transmitter tower." "The result: reception got better for an estimated 30,000 homes outside Anchorage but worse for many of the 70,000 homes in Anchorage." "The station's old antenna, atop the Anchorage Westward Hilton, was just 190 feet above the average Anchorage terrain....Reception was poor in some poarts of Anchorage and nil in others..."



Several applications for native languag networks using northern community stations and C BC repeaters are either pending or have been approved. They generally call for between two and eight hours per week. The CRTC has released its rules governing community stations. There would be two classes. Type A would be the first French or English station in a market. There would be little restriction on programming [or] on the type of commercials. They would be permitted, with CRTC permission, to broadcast the signal of a distant station when they were not programming locally. Type B would be in markets where there was already one or more commercial stations in the same language as the community station. They would be allowed 4-6 minutes/hour of commercials, and it would be expected that about 35% of the air time would be devoted to the spoken word, and could rebroadcast material from other community stations or from news services when not originating local programming. The CRTC said it would not require the same professional standards of the volunteer or paid staff or the quality of programming it expects of regular commercial stations. The Commission indicated that if a station felt that the conversion from a Class A to a Class B status would be particularly operous if a commercial station entered the market, then the community station should consider upgrading its status to that of a full commercial station and would receive preferential consideration. Student radio stations would have all restrictions on type of commercials removed, but that their number would be fixed when the license was given.


"The CBC has overhauled the schedules of the CBC Radio and CBC Stereo [FM] networks. While the Stereo net remains mostly classical, a designation of talk/MOR would cover about 90% of the CBC radio network schedule." both French and English, "There is still a one hour late evening classical music program and a rock program Saturday mornings but tm should definitely cover them. Paul L. Gaines sent slogans and pictures of bumper stickers from his area, and mentioned a new 500-w AM station in Westland MI with a directional antenna NW, which seems to spray their signal away from their studios and target audience (studio in Hamtramck MI), no calls or frequency given, and he sent a "World Tomorrow" radio log which lists such skip targets on FM as RJR 101.3 Christiana, Jamaica, Montego Bay 92.9, and the following RJR-FM stations all in Kingston, Jamaica: 92.7, 94.7, 95.7 and 104.5; and an FM station finally shows up in a New Zealand station list: "KCC-FM" 90.3 Whangarei.

I quoted from Danny Buntin's review of KCMA Owasso OK's translator in downtown Tulsa, which was in a recent VUD. This quote was in a letter to Dr. John Major, owner of KCMA. "VUD, I guess, means VhfUhfDigest, and WTFDA, I suppose, WorldTelevisionFmDxAssociation, from reference to page 11 in the ninth edition. Buntin's comments were interesting-it's frustrating to cover such a wide area, as the enclosed coverage map demonstrates, and at the same time get chopped up in downtown Tulsa. The overloading undoubtedly comes from three class C FM stations with their towers downtown (on top of apartment buildings). Fortunately, they plan to move outside town, since within a block or two of any of them they blanket any FM receiver . . The big news is enclosed, and it goes without saying that I have very mixed feelings about it. We are looking forward to taking life a little easier, but I doubt if I can stay from radio forever." [Article said KCMA is being sold to Federated Media (WTRC-WYEZ FM Fort Wayne IN, etc.), with no change in format from KCMA's c announced-yet.] John says "Delighted to hear the tenth edition is under way."

Following up on the story of WGFM 99.5 Schenectady and its nonling practices, Michael Neff, program manager, writes: 'Thanks for the opportunity to express my interest in the ID-ing story. I, too, share the frustrations when listening to stations that do not in themselves in any recognizable manner. In 1927 the station transmitted with 100,000 watts, and in 1930 with 200,000 watts, which surprised me. I thought only WLW Cincinnati had ever used over 50 kw AM in the United States.

And WGY has recently returned to the top of the Arbitron rat-

any repeater of KSKA on 89.5 at Wasilla. The following KASH 107.5.... KBLK 103.1 ? 88.3 2975

Anchorage were NOT on the air as of Sept. 23:

In Seward KMDT 103.1 also not on air. Aren't they and KBLK in Anchorage also 103.1, a little too close for each other? [No, they are 65 miles apart, so it is okeh!] Also, no repeater of KSKA was heard on 88.1 at Seward. . . Translator K265E J still repeating KGTL-FM not KGTL-AM. Since KPEN 101.7 went b, I Joubt it ever will repeat KGTL-AM, also a b station and also owned by David F. Becker. . . The Moody repeaters give a 'three in one ID' at regular three-hour intervals with their call-sign, mailing address for donations and frequency. All three are run by the same organization. Surprisingly, the announcement tape is narrated by an announcer from KGTL-FM." Rod sent a very good map of AK, which will be used in the next "FM Atlas." Also northern Canada (and the rest of Canada) has been completely remapped, with northern Canada's map supplied by W. R. Hepburn; both the AK and Canada maps are military naps and not copyrighted. Writes Nick Lombardi: 'When you get around to updating the Colorado map (Atlas page 65) I hope you will add an extra space between the two columns of Denver stations. Also on the subject of maps, DE-MD is hopelessly crowded and probably deserves its own two-page spread. OR-WA also seems a bit cramped." [A new WV-MD-DE map and a new VA-DC map have been done; and work should begin shortly on new OR and WA maps: AZ-NM have been enlarged with a new map.] Nick asks: "Isn't WMVV McDonough GA (if it ever comes on) supposed to be on *90.7 instead of the 89.7 you list on p. 5, November VUD?" [You're right-89.7 was a mistake-o.e.]

Dave Nieman sent a casette tape of his DX, and he's seen a four-bay transmitting antenna sprouting from a tower on top of a building at Genessee Community College for WGCC *90.7 Batavia NY; he's glad to see that I will be representing FMers on the Ray Briem ABC Talkradio Show Dec. 7. "I'll be listening for you; don't let us FMers down."

"Heard a 'Foxy-96' nonID, with a station promo, news of a concert in Mobile; 24 hours; id jingle, but no calls on half-hour. May be new WFTW-FM 96.5 in Fort Walton Beach," thinks Mike Dorner. On a recent trip to DC, there was no sign of WDCI *88.1 Lorton VA (which is listed at 30 w horizontal and having an application for *97.9 with a directional antenna), or WMUC *88.1 College Park MD (which is listed as 10 w h.v. but having an application for *87.9), "but it may have been an antenna problem" on the FM radio built into a Ramada Hotel TV set. "The signals were much better on this than on my portable." He heard a mysterious station on 96 .- (96.7? Baltimore?) with an un-id sounding like "Salsa 96". Mike is rejoining the WTFDA, and I say "welcome back"!

W. R. McIntosh sent a three-part series on the educational FM stations of southern CA, and one article on the financial woes of National Public Radio, vs. American Public Radio. KUSC *91.5, which left NPR, may have started a trend, but little KCSN *88.5 Northridge remains with NPR, as do most of the other area public radio stations. Now that APR is in the picture and with leading stations like KUSC leaving NPR, I do not feel as stongly about listing networks in the "FM Atlas" any more. Before, I thought it would be good to show at least the stations with NPR (which are CPB-qualified), but the lines of distinction on that basis are fading. The article on KCRW *89.9 does not mention the station's "strong SCA on 67 kHz

of 'foregound music,' while KLON *88.1 has had recent SCA tests on 57 kHz-data noise." Another article stated KBIG 104.3 has Mormon church programs at times, but Mc has not heard gospel programming "for months" on their SCA. Finally, he sent an article mentioning KJOI 98.7 Los Angeles to be sold to Cleveland broadcaster Carl E. Hirsch for \$44 million. This would be the highest price ever paid for an FM station. 'Only 14 months ago, KJOI was purchased by Noble Broadcasting Group for \$18.5 million, which was a record price at the time."

Back on the air, but at very low power, is WOCG *90.1 Huntsville AL. "Barely readable with whip antenna" in New Hope AL oy Keith Pugh

Phil Sullivan sent an article on color slow-scan video being sent out by WOSU-FM at 92 kHz, from Ohio State University at Columbus, to Newark OH, 60 miles distant. Slow-scan video images were single field NTSC color, with an eight second transmission time. "Picture quality was considered excellent and there was no degradation in either the main channel signal (classical music) or the 67 kHz subcarrier channel (a reading for the blind service). The FM radio subcarrier will economically deliver instruction to distant locations while conventional phone cir-

cuits will be used for audio interactivity.

While in northern Michigan, I called WGGL Houghton, to find out why the \$ disappears and there is no SCA at times. I learned that when they pick up MPR off the air, via microwave from Duluth, it goes direct to the transmitter in Painesdale MI, and is transmitted in stereo with SCA. But they can also pick up the signal via satellite at their studio in Houghton; however, the cost of broadcast phone lines is so high, they can only afford one quality telephone connection to the transmitter; hence the mono and lack of SCA. The manager told me, between you and me, the transmitter is poorly located for MI coverage-it does a good job of serving Grand Marais MN." I told him of the map (which was in the July VUD, p. 27) MPR put out which shows WGGL as only supplying a small circle of coverage in NE MN (no MI coverage shown, as if they do not care about MI listeners). Even the time announced on WGGL is usually Central Standard, not Eastern, with most "local" announcements for Duluth, not for Houghton-Hancock MI.

Also in MN, KCGN 101.5 Ortonville (with transmitter in

SD, for you folk who count your DX according to "location) says about their translators: "They have a signal radius of from 6 to 12 miles. We are getting excellent performance from the translators in Aberdeen and Kerkhoven with plans already under way to improve the performance of the Marshall and Willmar translators. Please pray for Bob Finstrom and others who are working on these improvements."

"Radio Business Report" newsletter claims "Metros often larger than most stations' coverage patterns-new areas added closer to another market than to home central city. Hardest hit: Class A FMs and Class IV AMs, directional AMs-problemmany of these don't subscribe, don't get to vote on definition. Only AM clears and hi-power FMs seem to like it." No examples were given, however.

Pete Nolan: "VUD, you show a station granted in Honolulu HI on 100.3.I have the same facility on 105.1. [100.3 is it, and I checked the printed FCC datalist. WGOD 97.9 Charlotte Amalie is indeed religious. This comes from the GM of competing station WVIS-106.1; he's an 'M Street Journal' subscriber . . No word vet on what the new KGLF 103.3 Freeport TX will do. or what the new owners will do with KGOL 107.5 Lake Jackson (though it will definitely be programmed to Houston and definitely won't be religious). KHCB 105.7 has their new power/height and their signal is vastly improved KXKX 106.5 Galveston was off the air for several days recently. Seems they had some minor problem with the line voltage coming into the transmitter site (it was about 250 instead of 220), the local utility came out to fix it, and when they turned it back on it was closer to 310 and everything started smoking. The station lost about \$6,000 in equipment, went back on the air with a programmable decoder borrowed from KRBE-FM, and is looking into its legal options vis-a-vis Houston Lighting and Power. Score another victory for incompetance. . . .

"WFBQ 94.7 Indy is under fire again by the group called Decency in Programming. An early morning program with Bob and Tom is considered offensive, indecent, and profane. Dirty jokes and sexual talk will not be tolerated! They are sexist, offensive, and racist, according to listeners. Children are taking radios on school buses and listening to the program every morning. There is talk that it may be reported to the FCC. I haven't listened to the program myself, so can't comment until I do. I understand WFBQ's ratings have improved because of this program. What stations won't do for more popularity and higher ratings!" writes Ralph Strobel. Ralph says WDHS 91.1 Gaston

IN, r mono, on air a few hours in the morning. Continues to sound like a pirate station. "A waste of the airwaves! Claims 18 watts, 106.3 IN Columbia City, NOT on air as vet, I've logged three new ones on 106.3 since this station folded- Sarnia ON. Union City PA and Gibson City IL." And construction has started on the tower for the new Muncie station, WOKZ 104.9. Jim PIzzi heard KWMI Midland TX 103.3 on 103.7 several times recently. He's written them, but no response yet. WEVE-FM 97.9 Eveleth MN now there, from 100.1, with tower near Giant's Ridge Ski Area, Biwabik MN. TV ads show skiing and the station's call letters and correct frequency given, now 71 kw, and not a potent signal at all in Esko, which is 22 km wsW of Duluth.

Kermit Reid has some GA news, or run ors: WABE 90.1 Atlanta, plagued with poor uniformity of radiation pattern since going 100 kw atop Stone Mountain, is expected to move off the mountain to solve the problem. WRAS *89.3 is scheduled to go to 50 kw by Feb., WWEV *91.5 Cumming GA is moving to 8 kw by now. WJYA 104.1 is hoping to improve their rim-shot signal by moving closer to Atlanta (Newnan GA). "I've heard that WPIQ 101.5 Brunswick GA has been approved for a 1505' tower at Woodbine GA." (They only have an application on file with the FCC for 445 meters.).WBGL *91.7 Champaign IL loses transmitter in a fire, but resumed operation Sept. 17 after supporters of the gospel station donated money; loss was set at \$60,000. .Canada's extra-legal Indian radio station, CKON 97.3, mentioned in the Toronto "Globe and Mail," Aug. 3. CRTC is quoted about the Cornwall Island ON station: "I don't think we'll have a great deal of difficulty with them (unless) they cause some interference to anybody. But nobody else is doing anything with regard to that particular service. As long as we can licence them so that they are legitimate, ther that's good.'

John Combs sent the ad appearing on the first page of this column about WFAM losing jazz in favor of "queasy-listening" music. Well, later, Jones College ran a large ad, striking a low blow at the jazz fan who took out the original ad. WKTZ's reads: Beautiful Music Lovers, rejoice. The real WKTZ-FM is back! Maybe you remember, we sold our beautiful Jones College Radio Station years ago while it was the most popular station in Jacksonville . . and the new owners donated the original call letters, WKTZ, the most precious possession we ever had, back to Jones College Radio. That happened because we nad a nonprofit radio station with a jazz format called WFAM, So on Oct. 1st, we changed WFAM to WKT2 at 90.9 on the FM dial, changed the music back to the original beautiful music format, and presto the real WKTZ-FM is back. That really started something. A lot of people like jazz-the jazz we played on WFAM. And a spirited jazz fan, Robert J. Beckham, liked it so much he ran ads. . . We listened to a lot of phone calls. Two of every seven wanted jazz. Five of every seven wanted beautilful music-more than 70%! And you might want to call 354-9022 and tell Robert J. Beckham that you like jazz but you love beautiful music. that's 354-9022 . At any rate, Jones College Radio is back and intends to be better than ever.

John says no jazz in the immediate area now, but WUFT-FM carries some. At a drive-in theatre in Miami is a radio system on 89,1 that plays the movies to parked cars. Shows are often Xrated, and religious broadcaster WRMB *89.3 is concerned that passing listeners might hear a dialog like: "Take my hands" (a spiritual), followed by: "Hey gang, what say we all take a community shower?" ". And let me sing words only for my king." WRMB announcer Jim Cress, whose records mix with the blue language at the theater, says he shudders at the thought of it: "It's like going from something heavenly to something that comes from the pits of hell. My concern is that a bona fide listener trying to get our station one night might pick up that garbage instead." The FCC isn't sure if it is legal; "If they're broadcasting over FM, I just don't know. I've never seen that done before, and it concerns me." I guess he's never heard of my real estate radio, which used 104.1, and was widely publicized in Nebraska. John Combs now editorializes concerning some comments in my column, Oct., p. 5, where I print Rich Eddie's comments and end with "or is this a fair comparison?" With all due respect NO, it isn't! The FM ATLAS is a superior publica-tion and there cannot be enough accoledes directed . . for masterminding it. However, keep in mind that the ATLAS has a much wirler circulation than the WTFDA's TV Station Guide or Translator Guide. The appeal of the Atlas extends far beyond the very small group of FM DXers; I can't begin to count the number of libraries in which I've seen it. The ATLAS is only one of several aspects of what must be at least a marginally pro-fitable business for you. By contrast, the TV and Translator Guides are intended for a very small audience, are produced by volunteer labor, and are sold by a nonprofit organization. It would be very difficult to match the frequency, accuracy, and quality of the FM ATLAS under those circumstances. I think the comparison is particularly unfair as regards the Translator Guide, since it is the first real effort to produce such a work. Bill Fahber has done an outstanding job, and who knows how many revised editions may appear in future years? The compariso with the ATLAS is, at best, premature.

ABC TALKRADIO / RAY BRIEM SHOW

'A VIID reader who asks to be anonymous wants to comment about the CBS FMX System, as discussed previously in this column. He has traveled to Stamford CT and visited CBS Labs three months ago to discuss the system:

I tried to pick up all the different newspapers I could find. Didn't end up with very nuch but thought you might like the

two items I c id cut out anyway [station logos].

Re FMX: The CBS FM Extension System (FMX) adds an extra
L-R subchannel in quadrature (shifted 90 degrees) to the normal one, which contains the usual difference information except it is compressed dynamically. When properly decoded, the special L-R reduces the usual stereo noise by about 20 dB. This can make the difference between a noisy signal and one that is very acceptable. It is claimed that stereo signals with FMX can be received at al out the same distance as mono.

There is a price to be paid, of course. FMX was designed to be compatible with normal stereo receivers, but unless the 19 kHz pilot circuit of the receiver is very accurate, one of two things occurs. Stereo separation is reduced or exaggerated. The severity depends on the error, and the pilot phase accuracy must be about 200 times closer than for decoding a normal stereo signal. Another aspect is who would benefit from the system. Many radio stations process to increase loudness and/or broadcest music recorded with heavy compression. DXers are probably already aware this pertains particularly to rock and pop music.

Such programming would gain little from FMX.

On the other hand, stations using little compression are likely to have the most demanding listeners who, although fewer in number, would readily appreciate the noise reduction of FMX. Classical music is probably the best example, but jazz, talk and easy listening formats could also benefit. Any programming with wide dynamic range would be received with less noise. Given these considerations, it is hard to say if CBS will succeed in selling FMX to the broadcasters. We DXers would certainly appreciate it, but we are hardly a majority! It will be interesting to watch this development . . . Knowing FMX to be of interest to VUD readers, I carefully went over the above to be sure it was correct and polite. You may use it in your column if you wish, but please don't mention my name as a contributor. I want to stay neutral on the matter and see what develops. Next month, I may get to make a trip to the Netherlands to visit Philips. It may get to make a trip to the Netnerlands to visit rimips. It hasn't been approved yet, but I have already been invited. I may even drive over into Germany. Have hoped for many years to work on a project that would involve foreign travel, and this may be it! Earlier I signed up for an evening conversational German course to get ready. . My hope is to find out what auto-motive reception is like over there. Observing rather than merely reading about the radio station setup and programming will also

In other FM-related news, rumor has it WLLZ 98.7 Detroit may be sold, as told in the "Detroit Free Press." "Even prestigious trade publication Radio and Records noted it in a recent issue. But Gary Stevens, the former Detroit radio personality who runs Doubleday's broadcasting division-which owns WLLZ-said that's not the case. 'We sold our Chicago station, so right away everyone's running around and saying everything we had was up for sale,' Stevens said. 'WLLZ is not up for sale'.'' Local indepen lent prgrammer Fred Jacobs wants it known he is NOT the program consultant for WDTX 99.5, which replaced WCLS. Station co-owner Lorraine Golden had named Jacobs as the consultant, but the former WRIF program director said he merely helped the new management with some research. . . And WHYT 96.3 is placing pictures of missing chudren on the backs

of weekly "Hot Hit Surveys," which it distributes.

Custody of WIAN '90.1 Indianapolis is getting to be a messy thing. The School board wanted to give the license to WFYI (channel 20), the local PBS station. According to an article in the Indianapolis News, the WIAN antenna is hanging on the ch. 20 tower north of the city, with transmitter controls in the ch. 20 building. But then the attorneys for the school board found that surplus school property can't merely be sold; it must be auctioned to the highest bidder. Then they thought that the license, not just the equipment, had value, an' should be auctioned. Other parties are interested in bidding for WIAN, if the process should get that far. Butler University runs WAJC *104.5. If Butler bought WIAN, WAJC could move to *90.1, and "be free to sell its license for 104.5 to a commercial operator. Depending on who is counting, it could sell from \$3 to \$10 million. Another interested party is Cable Entertainment, Inc., the black-owned company that produces commercial entertainment on ch. 32." That company recently bought WZZT in sub-urban Columbus OH. Now for the ridiculous part: "CEI is going on the theory that it could persuade the FCC to allow it to convert WIAN's 90.1 frequency from noncommercial to commercial use." Knowing the current F(C, that could happen, but it would be a long-shot. I am sure WFYI would enter the bidding war and see to it that it gets custody of WIAN, but tune in later and see what happens!





In the "Blood on the TV Antenna" department - some tips on screening parabolic antennas. I've found that cutting the hardware cloth into 5 inch strips and attaching them to each of the rear reflectors individually with nylon cable ties works very well. Allow the strips to extend beyond the edges of the dish and to overlap as they will. It is easiest to do the top half and bottom half separately, then put the dish together. The cable ties can be put on loosely, then pulled tight when you are sure everything is properly aligned. If you use large swatchs of hardware cloth, it has a tendancy to distort the curvature of the dish. Using the cable ties insures that the screen will stay on over time, wire rusts, especially after being twisted (and too, twisting all those wires is hard on the fingers and is extremely tedious!). To save on blood loss, be sure to wear gloves and use the largest pair of metal shears you can find. Oh yeah, don't forget to have your tetnus shots up to date. Hi!

Most striking, an August without any FM Es! The first such I've suffered thru since getting serious with FM Dxing. Perseid meteors a bit productive - however, hard to find a clear channel anymore without some faint trop hanging there. Spent a lot of time on 92.5 trying to null down Dallas. 88.5 good but kept getting KDCR! In July-Aug. local on 101.9 at various times running its auxiliary xmtr(apx 3.7 mi. north of me vs. main apx 7.3 mi. se). With all the overload, crossmod, etc., I thought my tuner had developed a problem. Finally matched the problem with the changes in signal/direction of the local. Almost got into the market for a tuneable FM trap!

Considering the August lack of Es, the Sept. 23rd event really a shock - with the MUF reaching something it never got to all summer here: 2-Meters. Can't recall another Sept. with 7 new Es catches. The Mexico portion(4) provided two new estados(Oax., Yuc.). No Mexico City stations noted; I don't know how many are active since the quake (Sept. 19), but reports had the 96.9 tower down.

A strange thing with the Oct. ducting was there was virtually no evidence of it on the TV. (But there's not much TV between Miami and Key West.) I'd noticed the rock station on 92.5 and thinking it was Dallas went nne with the antenna and lost it! Peaking ese I was pretty sure who it was, but the ID was long in coming. I didn't really catch on with the 89.7 religious for a while but luckily they stayed in for the hour until a full ID. I checked for other Miami and south Fl stations but those were the only one in. I think WMCU antenna much south of the others in Miami. A very sharp duct(or most of it into the Gulf etc., where nil on.) Meteor rates were up some on Oct 8-9, but I think the Orionids later in the month might have been better. Certainly nothing close to a meteor "storm" some had hoped for. Local-to-be 89.1 target now next Spring. And, as feared they'll be pumping their 100-kw ERP from a site some 3.7 miles nne of me. That's almost the same distance the local 101.9 aux smtr was making a mess of things from. At least there's some time to get a good tuneable trap. 73. (Or a new tuner? DB)

1 Only black & white glossy prints will be considered for publication.

Don't send photos that date back more then 3 months. (This is a news column.)

All photos submitted become the property of WTFDA and this column. They won't be returned. Be sure that all information about the picture submitted accompanys it. For DX photos; call letters or station name, channel number, location (city, state or province & country if not Canada, Mexico

or USA), distance (in miles), propagation mode, and complete date of reception (month, day & year). Time of day if you like; but it's not necessary. For DX shack and antenna photos; be sure equipment names and model numbers are included in your photo caption. If any information is missing: the photo will not be considered for publication.

The Worldwide TV-FM DX Association or the Photo-News column editor will not debate these rules. If you have any objection to these rules; we suggest you put them in writting and send them to WTFDA Headquarters-P.O. Box 514-Buffalo,NY 14205

FOR YOUR INFORMATION

Photos that are selected for publication in the VUD are taken (grouped together [11 at a time] which keeps costs at a minimum) to a Photo engraver where they undergo a dot screening process. This process makes your photos reproduce in gray tones from black to white. If this was not done, your photos would look like the print in the VUD; black on white paper. Screening gives your photos difinition. So pictures that are too light or too dark will not reproduce well. In 1985 the WTFDA paid out \$109.00 in photo screening bills. That is 101 photos divided by 12 VUC issues - and average of 8.4166666 photos per issue.

Television screen photos do not have to be of a DX station. If a new station comes on the air in your area; take a picture of the test pattern (with call letters) or call slide. This is news. Printing of this photo may help a fellow DXer identify that distant station someday.

For the best TV DX photos; use a camera that has adjustable exposure and shutter settings. Tri-X film [400 ASA] works the best. Set the shutter speed at 1/30th of a second and the F-stop at 5.6.

Photo-News can't promise to print all the pictures it receives. Printing of photos will be done on an individual member basis. Example; if you submitte 24 photos a year. Do not expect too see all of them in print. But if you send in only 5 photos a year. You can expect too see them in the VUD.

CHANNEL MASTER MODEL #7206 HI-O LIHE TV TRAP

by Rich Wertman

With many of these traps already in use and many wondering of their results I figured a down to earth summary should be made. These traps are a definite help, but not always a total cure, to overloading by locals.

However, this trap does a heck of a job in my case, where I have 2 locals both with over 1 million watts and within 12 miles of my QTH. The unit itself is quite rugged, but I wouldn't dare mount it outside unless it was in a total-weatherproof housing. It has 2 very precise weatherproof vernier tuners which are not at all sloppy, and an input and output jack. It is meant to be rack mounted and includes sheet metal screws for this purpose. It is housed in an all steel case, but inside, the walls are shielded with copper.



With the vernier tuners the trap almost seems like it won't tune out anything, but this is usually due to the fact that the person tuning is tuning the dials too fast. These things tune so tight that you can totally miss the trapping area. That is a characteristic of the #7206 that everyone gets used to after a few tries! The specs are: insertion loss - .5 db; attenuation - 40 dB. It is AC-DC passive if you're running an amp through it. These units are

also highly stable and will not drift no matter what weather conditions are. I still believe that trapping before the amp is the the best method because if you let a signal reach your amp (for example a 15dBmv local) it will then get another boost from whatever your amp gives it—and by the time that all reachs your trap indoors you'll have a hell of a mess of images on your hands. Sometimes that #7206 just can't do it all on its own!

If you don't have a "super bad" problem with a local or if you're just having an adjacent channel problem I believe this trap to be an excellent choice. The price range on these isn't as crazy as as some others they usually sell, either, at around \$70.00--and well worth it! I'm not sure how all the other hi-Q traps that CM manufactures are, but they should work just as well if not better (since some are rated at 60 dB attenuation) than the #7206 trap.

My final comments on this unit are that it is a fine trap if you don't have an <u>overgained</u> amp and your nearest UHF local is not closer than about 15 miles away. If they are closer, it might be wise to use 2 traps or a trap at the antenna terminals.

I rate the 7206 trap a "10" and would recommend it to anyone experiencing overload and adjacent channel problems. Hope I've helped to answer some questions on this trap. -73. Rich

The Transequatorial skip between Central America and Argentina occurs very often; in a little town, called Coronel Suarez (350 miles from Buenos Aires) there is a small group of DXers which has been working FM and TV for many years, and has logged many FM stations of Central America; Puerto Rico and Coronel Suarez are on the same meridian (+ 65 degrees west)."
