

#### SPRACHMAN'S CORNER

First, the mail. Stephen West has been sending me parts of a project he has been working on, an atlas of UHF full and low power television stations. Hopefully, when it is completed we can pursuade Steve to have it plugged in the VUD. If anyone is interested in helping Steve with this project, write to him at 26 Dougherty Blvd, Apt G8, Glen Mills PA 19342.

The DX show "SIGNALS" is no more. It disappeared in January quite unexpectedly. But fear not, for those DX junkies who want their news fresh there is Glenn Hauser's DX DAILY. It is on Short Wave radio station WHRI, 9490 kHz, Monday through Friday 9 to 9:15 pm EDT. Beginning this month is a new show to replace SIGNALS on WWCR 7435 kHz on Saturdays at 11:35 pm EDT. It will have many of the same features as signals as well as several new features. On the Satellites, there is the LET'S TALK RADIO NÉTWORK, on Spacenet 3, Transponder 18, audio subcarrier 5.8, wideband audio, 9 pm to 12 midnight, 7 nights a week. LTRN concentrates on news about the satellite industry and related technologies.

The changes occuring on the Satellites are at a rapid rate. New over the past two months: the Z Music Channel (G1/15) with a Christian Hard Rock and Rap video format. GEMS Television (S2/24), aimed at Spanish speaking women with Novelas, and shows on fashions. Also in Spanish is the Canal de Noticias NBC (S2/5). Women in Saris and movies from the Indian Subcontinent make up the programming day on TV ASIA (G3/7). To figure out who moved where, you need a score card. Speaking about score cards, forget about watching Major League Baseball in the clear. Almost all the backhauls are encripted. At least with Basketball and Hockey, encription was the exception and not the rule.

New on the radio scene on Long Island is WBZO 103.1 from Bay Shore NY. How many radio stations can say that their transmitting tower is a light house? The station started life as WBSI. A week before their expected sign-on date, WBLI 106.1 in Patchougue NY filed suit charging that there would be confusion with the call letters. WBSI was allowed to begin broadcasting, their ID announcement was "WBSI Bay Shore, B103, not to be confused with WBLI Patchoque."

Also new on 103.1 is WJUS from Bergen County NJ. They call themselves "Juke Box Radio" and play Pop-Standards from the 1940's.

Finally, I've seen W07OC on the ID screen with the "WNYX" stations (W38AM, W44AI, and W54AY). Does this mean that the psychics are now seen in Philadelphia?

Yep, that's it, only three classified legals this month, all of them relatively meaningless unless you work for the Scholastic Information Network!

Information Network

I guess I should add a station to the "STATIONS OFF THE AIR" classification -- TV Marti, whose balloon was pulled loose from its tether by bad weather on March 4. Officials said the transmitter was located 5km away on Little Knock 'em Down Key. (don't you love that name?!) Damage hasn't yet bee assessed. In 1991, TV Marti blew into the Everglades & was off the air for a month.

WMTT-28 Cookeville, Tenn. has been sold; this may (or may not..) indicate an imminent return to the air for this dark station. Also sold was KOOG-30 Ogden/Salt Lake, Utah, which was sold to a religious organization.

A hearing has been ordered over who gets the license for noncommercial channel 39 in Bakersfield, California. The competing applicants are Community TV of Southern California (KCET-28 Los Angeles) and Valley Public Television. (KVPT-18 Fresno)

An appeals court in Washington has upheld the must-carry provisions of the Cable Act. One of the judges said he was convinced cable's opposition had nothing to do with First Amendment rights. only with economic concerns. Barring a successful appeal by cable firms, systems will be required to carry all qualifying stations within 60 days of the date the rules are published in the Federal Register. (which means late May or early June)

15 days later, stations will be required to decide whether to force carriage, or try to negotiate for a payment from the cable system for carriage. (in the latter case, called "retransmission consent", if negotiations fail, the cable system may drop the station) Stations may change their mind every three vears.

In related Cable Act activity. the FCC has taken two major actions. First, they've ordered most cable systems to roll back subscription rates by approximately 10%. Second, "program-access" rules have been adopted, forcing programmers like CNN, HBO, and USA to make their fare available to wireless cable, DBS, and other alternative technologies. (if you've ever wondered just how bureaucratic FCC rulings can be, note that the rate-rollback order summary -- not the order itself -required three pages of 17 characters-per-inch type to reproduce in Broadcasting magazine!)

And, in an attempt to raise enough money to pay for the cost of implementing the Cable Act, the FCC is considering imposing user fees on cable systems. The exact structure of the fees hasn't been decided.

John Walson died in Allentown, Penna, on March 27. Walson was responsible for the first CATV system. He sold GE TV sets in Mahonoy City, Penna., and realized that his sales were limited by poor reception, caused by hilly terrain. At first, his service was provided for free.

An advertisement in Broadcasting indicates that CBS's WCIX-6 Miami has signed an LMA with WDLP-35 in that city. It's unclear 3 what kind of programming CBS plans

to air on channel 35. WDLP and WCIX have their towers in south Dade Co., some 50km south of the remaining Miami-area stations. (actually, WCIX is currently broadcasting from the WTVJ-4 tower in north Dade, after the channel 6 tower was destroyed by Hurricane Andrew, but CIX is rebuilding near their old site)

WKYT-27 Lexington and WYMT-57 Hazard, and two Lexington radio stations, now belong to the state of Kentucky. The state's insurance regulation department took over the assets of Kentucky Life Insurance Co., the stations' owner, after the insurance company got into financial trouble.

Also in trouble is Lorianne Crook's new LPTV in Branson, Mo.. (anyone have any details on this? The only Branson station I show is K25BD, a TBN) Dr. Joe Bryant, a Lebanon, Tenn. dentist, claims Crook and her husband, Jim Owens, owe him \$2,000,000 for the purchase of dark WJFB-66. Owens' firm went bankrupt in 1991 after producing several months of programming for WJFB. Channel 66 was unable to get on the Nashville cable system.

British video equipment firm Quantel has demonstrated a device that records up to 90 minutes of randomly accessible digital video & audio on 3-1/2" computer hard disks. (sixty hard disks are used!) Because it's random-access, video and audio can be instantly manipulated & edited. The "Clipbox" lists for \$540,000. A previous Quantel device, the "Harry", recorded up to 90 seconds of video in RAM memory.

The city of New York and New York State have given CBS \$50,000,000 in incentives, including sales tax exemptions, investment incentives, and energy cost reductions, to keep them from moving to New Jersey. A previous agreement gave NBC \$73,000,000 to stay in NYC (and they've moved some operations to Ft. Lee, NJ and Charlotte, NC anyway..), and now ABC says they expect similar treatment.

#### LPTV WATCH

This will be a new section, which will report changes to LPTVs & new LPTVs on the air, as reported by you, the readers. (I have no reliable source of official LPTV information, and in any case, the

sheer volume of LPTV legals for off-air stations would dominate the column.) Good information on operating LPTVs is, however, desired & appreciated. This month's is courtesy of phone calls from John Combs and e-mail from Matt Sittel.

Call St City; programming W47BP MS Hattiesburg; WMAH-19 (PBS) K22DP TX Bryan; Video Jukebox K33DB TX Houston; KTFH-94 (Spanish) K57FH TX College Stn.; this TBN has moved to channel 47.

#### **FORUM**

Mike Hawk, Omaha, NE:

Ouch. Mike caught me with a rather serious error in my March column, under "RF, Cancer, and TV Broadcasts". I wrote that a 3000kW UHF-TV is 5000 times more powerful than a 0.6W portable cellular phone. Obviously, this is incorrect-- it's really 5,000,000 times more powerful.

This is a fundamental error that damages (but doesn't destroy) the basis of the article. After allowing for the different distance from the transmitting antenna, the RF field from the UHF-TV station is, in fact, roughly 1/2 that of the phone. (not 1/1800) It is, however, still true that this power will drop off relatively quickly as you move away from the base of the tower. It's just that I'll be treating UHF-TV towers with more respect in the future...

#### John Combs, Orlando, FL:

John caught me in another error. (I wasn't having a very good month!) In the April column, I'd written that WGGS-16, WGSE-43, and KMCT-39 are TBNs. John says that the licensee of these stations, Carolina Christian Broadcasting, has severe theological differences with Paul Crouch & his friends at TBN, and seriously doubted that any CCB-owned stations would carry TBN.

I inferred that from a list of TBN affiliates printed in the May 1991 VUD, which listed WGGS-16. Matt Sittel says he has, indeed, seen some TBN on WGGS, but not on WGSE; neither WGSE nor KMCT is listed in the TBN list either. Which would enforce the suspicion that WATC-57 Atlanta will end up an independent religious station.

Mike Reid, North York, ON:

Writing from Florida, Mike has a few notes. With regard to WYDP-25 being sold to the Univ. of North Florida, Mike wonders what the University plans to do with it, given that Jacksonville already has a PBS affiliate (WJCT-7), and WUFT-5 Gainesville is on cable there. That's a good question, but several cities do have multiple educational stations. In some places, the second stations air PBS programs at shifted times; in others, instructional or classroom programs are aired.

With regard to KNRR-12, Mike informs me that the CRTC usually allows only four USA stations on any given Canadian cable system; usually, ABC/CBS/NBC/PBS affiliates are carried, this makes it difficult for Fox affiliates (like KNRR) to get onto Canadian cable systems. He also speculates that the channel 13 allotment (CHMI-13 Portage la Prairie) was created specifically to hamper reception of KNRR.

With regard to recentlyreturned-to-the-air WMFD-68 in
Ohio, Mike asks whether this is
really the same station as the
WCOM-68 that went off a few years
back. Well, that depends on how
you define "same station" but I'd
say yes. It takes the FCC several
years to revoke the license of a
dark station (indeed, I don't know
of a station that was on the air at
one time but lost its license for
inactivity) and I know that the
WCOM license was transferred,
intact, to the new owners.

The exact definition of when a station came on the air can be rather difficult though. Mike mentions the case of WKBF-61 Cleveland, which went off in 1974. In 1980, the channel was resurrected as WCLQ-61. (now WQHS) Did WQHS come on the air in 1968 (WKBF's start date), 1980 (WCLQ's start date after a dark period), or 1986? (when the license was transferred to its current owner)

Even more difficult, what happens when stations lose their license & a new license is issued to another licensee, with little or no intervening dark period? While rare, two Boston stations suffered this fate. WHDH-5 (yea, I know, WHDH is now channel 7, but that's a different story!) lost its license in 1972; a new licensee returned the station to the air the next

day- reportedly using new equipment, especially unusual as in most cases of lost licenses, the new licensee buys the equipment from the old one. As a result of this incident, the Television Factbook lists channel 5 as having come on the air in 1972-- although it had, in fact, been broadcasting since 1957.

In another case, channel 7 (then WNAC-TV, later WNEV-TV, and now WHDH-TV!) lost <u>its</u> license in 1982; the channel was awarded to a combination of two competing applicants. However, for some reason, this station is still listed as having come on the air on its original date in 1948!

None of the above necessarily reflects official WTFDA policy on what constitutes a new station for purposes of reporting to the DX Statistics columns.

Finally from Mike this month, a clipping from the Florida Times—Union of Jacksonville. A local woman was showing her 6-year-old granddaughter from Nebraska around the city. The girl's uncle is an engineer for WJKS-17; when the grandmother reached the Hogan Road tower farm, she pointed out the WJKS tower & said "That one on the right is your Uncle Bill's tower." To which the girl replied, "Ooooh, that's great. Which one's yours?"

#### MARCH'S GULF TROP RETURNS

#### TV-FM DXING DESERVES SOME PROMOTING

This month SFM goes international with Australia reporting for the first time in quite some time. New Zealand is one place Australia can receive via Es. For further insight for what else is possible in Australia, don't miss the DXer's interesting comments that follow his lodgings For further international flavor, one reporter tells what was available to be heard during his stay in the Dominican Republic. Looking elsewhere for DX, March often works out as the one major month for gulf trop, and so one Florida reporter pulled in 3 days worth of it approaching 1000 miles.

There was no SFM last month due to no reports, which brings up a good time to suggest ways of promoting the hobby of TV-FM DXing. This little hobby of ours surely deserves more promoting than it currently gets. Over the last decade the rise of cable TV surely was rough on TV-FM DXing. Hooking up to cable got people off antennas in droves. These days cable companies are trying to coax remaining holdouts by offering them a less expensive broadcast only package. And of course, while cable was booming so were the airwaves with new stations coming on. To counteract this, perhaps some of the fine writers of the club could contact editors of certain publications and offer to do a piece on TV-FM DXing. Publications to target could be those with reading audiences in usually good positions to take up the hobby of DXing. For instance, this could mean retired people. Some of those folks are abandoning the urban rat race entirely by moving to DX friendly places, like small towns. Some California retirees are moving to such places in Oklahoma and Arkansas. They are attracted there to the lower cost of living and because their parents migrated from those two states during the Dustbowl days. It's like the Grapes of Wrath story in reverse. Another potentially good audience to target for DXing are the folks living in rural areas such as the western plains. As you may know, driving through rural areas off the interstates is a fascinating time for me. Last year, while I was on a drive between Lawton and Altus, OK it was quite an interesting sight to come up to an isolated rural subdivision of several dozen homes situated where mesquite bushes grow with rocky hills lining much of the horizon. But of most interest nearly every home had installed beside it a mega TV antenna system mounted atop towers up to 75 or so feet high. The antennas were usually point toward the Oklahoma City antenna farm around 100 miles away. I just can't get over how the rural people can go all out with their marvelous TV antenna installations, but for some reason can't get into TV-FM DX at least so you would know it through many pages of DX reporting in the VUD. That neck of the woods must be the fairy land of DXing. Only the fairies don't

Since this is my first contribution to Southern FM DX, I will supply some details about my background. My first attempts at tr and mw DX started in 1969 when I was just 4 years of age. FM DX was tried for the first time in 1980 and gradually the interest developed. The most distant FM signals received via tropospheric propagation here in Sydney have been Auckland and Te Aroha, New Zealand at 1400 miles. Sporadic E layer propagation has provided western Australian FM at 1900-2050 miles. During November 92 to February 92 our sporadic E season proved to be reasonable with several Australian, New Zealand, Norfolk Island and New Caledonian signals. I have included a very small sample log of DX for Nov.-Feb. During an intense New Caledonian opening on 6/2/92, an American operated outlet in the Pacific Ocean area was noted on 93.9 from a bearing of 50-60°. Norfolk Island on 93.9 is received frequently in Sydney. However, they only carry Australian material. The closest U.S. territory to Australia is Samoa, which would indicate a minimum distance of at least 2800 miles. Program material consisted of the weekly Top 40 with Rick Dee and several US Army/Navy advertisements were included with the 1-800 phone number. We've already determined that KUAM Guam was not carrying this program and KMTH Midway Island is no longer in operation. A colleague has written to the FCC for a list of FM stations operating in the Pacific Ocean. (Todd, Thanks for joining WTFDA and your report. Keep on showing us what FM DXing is all about in Australia, DB)

Some of these, especially the Santo Domingo stations, may have been translators.
I used an FM stations list prepared several years go by Dominican DXistas Cesar Objio of the National Radio Club and his cousin Franklin Objio. Anyone who would like a copy of the list, please write to me. Slogans are as heard over the air(and may actually represent a program name instead of ID). Most, but not all, stations appear to sign off in the early mornings. I used a Sony ICF-2010 with built in whip, which is not so good on FM. The many open channels on the band were largely silent, and might have provided some interesting Tr or ms, but I was actually much more busy trying for Medium Wave DX during this trip. No sign of Turks and Caicos, Bahamas, Cuba or Puerto Rico. as I'd hoped.

From your SFM editor...My local KKND 105.5 Stillwater, OK has just changed format to country. This is first time KKND has strayed from rock. They now go by "Y-105" but it's still KKND at top of the hour ID, though. KKND chose to keep the old DJs. The morning co-DJs may be more popular that any music since the audience generally enjoys their humorous bantering and canned productions. Cynics didn't think the rock DJs would be able to stand country music for a week since country lyrics tend to be so sad, but lasting they are. Another OK FM station switched to country is KSIM 99.5 Henryetta-Tulsa, giving the Tulsa market at least 4 country outlets compared to only 2 in the neighboring bigger Oklahoma City market. Country music is hot and no doubt the sound of the fiddle and the whine of the steel guitar will be heard more and more on FM.

RICHARD SHAFTAN's comments.

-First of all, some notes from my last report. The "WALZ" report from December 11th probably wasn't (maybe it was Florida?) since it is off the air. Also, the "WUSQ" logging that I thought was Buffalo apparently was, as it is now IDing as O-102.

The loggings after February 12th involve the Bolin phase box I bought from Bill Nienajadly. When Bill brought it over several months ago, I wasn't impressed with the results. What makes it work much better is adding a capacitor in the line of the main antenna before the attenuator. By tuning the capacitor, it makes the nulls much deeper as my mid-winter DX indicates.

-I am very impressed with the phase box. I can null any local in any kind of trop opening. Philly and other semi-locals can be nulled as the reports below indicate. I expect to get a few loggings this season on 105.5, where local WDHA is just three miles away. I have already received traces of other stations in the minor trop openings we have had this winter.

NOTES: The November 19 pirate was in \$tereo, had a good signal from the city centre to about 20 kilometres to the south, at which point it faded quickly despite the flat terrain. I caught it while leaving Ottawa by car. The male announcer played Jethro Tull, King Crimson, etc... in entire album format and said the broadcast would be eight hours long and there would be the "albumoriented rock" format. Gave a time check at 4:31 (live broadcast) and IDed as "90.1 FM \$tereo". The stereo is a first for me for a pirate. CKHC is not a pirate. It is 5 watts and is run by radio and journalism students/staff at Humber College. It has the CRTC's blessing, I am told. It's low in power and has therefore probably never been noticed by nearby DXers. I was driving through the area and tuning for Michigan. CKHC was playing deathly dull mainstream soft rock, sort of like the more powerful CIXX (Six-X) 106.9 in London, run out of Fanshawe College. CKHC often IDs as "91.7". A special note to Michael Hawk: CIMX 88.7 is in Winsdor, not Toronto. The 89X slogan you heard is indeed theirs. Don't mix it up with a relatively low power multilingual station on 88.7 (now 88.9-gc). in Etiobicoke (west Toronto). Congratulations on some great catches Michael! CFOR 1570 Orillia ON is scheduled to switch to 105.9 Spet. 1, friends there tell me. That means CBCO will move - the CBC tells me 91.5 sometime this summer, and that 107.5 Penetanguishene will also go off the air, as 91.5 will cover the entire area. Also later this year sometime, look for a parallel signal (to these CBC signals) on 94.3 in Huntsville, Ont. I guess that would mean 105.5 will no longer be a partial affiliate. I'm looking forward to having a more open 107.5 and no slop on adjacent frequencies, maybe in time for fall tropo!

KASP is an AM station, their format is top 40.



So whozit? Note #5: This is now my most distant UHF from Orlando -- topping KWEX-41 by one mile! Note #6: My first ever "phantom" xltr -- relaying video of WBFS-33 on channel 64. Note #/: With electronic bullelin board -- thanks to Jeff Kruzka for IP! Note #8: Runs ID 3/4 cb with huge STL calls and teeny-tiny legal ID! Note #9: Had to call MS ETV on the phone to confirm this as it is not in any lists! The c.e. says W47BP has an ERP of about 16 kw and went on the air 4/2/93 (just in time for this opening!). W47BP picks up WMAH-19 as its primary, which accounts for the + offset, even though Hattlesburg is assigned \*47z.

It's been a good spring for Gulf trops, although I still don't seem to get as much as Carlon Howington in St. Pete or Matt Sittel in my former QTH of Tallahassee! I've logged a lot of stations that were simply not on the air when I last DXed from Orlando, and have lot of stations that were simply not on the air when I last DXed from Orlando, and have seen several VHF stations (like WWL-4 and WJTV-12) that I haven't logged by tropo at ANY Florida QTH in at least 15 years. Also had my first tropo to Arkansas from here since 1974. Interestingly, the meterologist on WTVT-13's noon newscast on the 13th spent a good 2-3 minutes carefully explaining the inversion and why viewers may have been getting interference from Panama City and elsewhere. A very nice, coherent, ACCURATE presentation, with graphics and everything — refreshing! Lots of newles have Jumped the Orlando log up to 456 stations. 73, JOHN.

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#### IN SEARCH OF THE ULTIMATE E-SKIP ANTENNA FOR THE VHF FM/TV SPECTRUM


E-SKIP DX will be coming in soon--are you ready? Chances are good that you are not as likely to "trip over" or "stumble into" the first big opening of the season as you once would have been. Why? A big reason has to do with a simpler type of TV antenna that was popular with viewers in the 1950's and 1960's, before terms like "color," "deep-fringe," and "stereo" were the important catch-phrases in the antenna business. Many DX'ers seem to like to depend on the all-channel rooftop rotator-turned antenna to DX E-skip signals. These usually mean a compromise for performance on certain channel 2 thru 6 skip openings. I have found that most good all channel antennas that I have installed for customers and used at home for tropo inversion DX'ing, etc., were not always the "right stuff" for skip DX'ing.

Your basic E-skip DX signal is "skywave." It comes in from over the horizon often at a relatively high angle. When you take that together with the fact that E-skip is often rather strong (typically somewhat stronger than a tropo inversion DX signal), it makes sense that a good multi-element all channel antenna might not always be the best thing to receive it. Sometimes with E-skip, less is more. I have taken down many two-bay conicals in this area--some of them 30 years and older. My customers are always glad to get rid of them and consider the nice new satellite dish or all-channel Winegard a big improvement. What do those old conicals have that a new multi-element doesn't? They respond much better to high angle signals. That's why "airplane flutter" is so much more noticeable on these older conicals.

Now I am sure not suggesting that everyone should go out and take down their DX TV antenna and replace it with an salvaged conical from the junk yard. Although, if you want a conical, they're still available new from some distributors, believe it or not! ChannelMaster still has one based on a 50 yr old (!) design.

What I AM trying to suggest is that if you have the room for a second E-skip antenna, go out and get yourself a coaxial "A-B" switch and a smaller, simpler "E-skip" antenna that can be mounted at 10 feet or so above ground. A garage or toolshed roof might be really ideal for this! You may not even need a rotor for it, especially if it is a smaller log or yagi with just a few elements. With the switch, you could switch between your main VHF DX'ing antenna and the lower one during E openings. Don't be surprised if the lower, simple antenna gives you slightly better to much better results during some E-skip situations. In some of the "giant" openings when everything seems to be coming in from everywhere, it can make a difference sorting through the "hash" of multi-cochannel interference on channels 2 thru 6. It works as well (maybe even a bit better) on the FM band for me, and my FM receiver is nothing special. It's something I have noticed for several years now. Added benefit: in addition to responding to the higher angle shorter skip signals better than a large multi-element antenna, the simpler, lower antenna should be picking up less tropo or semi-local groundwave signal from unwanted co-channel stations. That in itself can be a great help!

In my opinion, if you were to DX E-skip, and nothing but E-skip exclusively, the best all-allround antenna would be a 5-element cut-to-channel, rotatable, and of variable height. Of course, it isn't too practical to have something like this for every channel and frequency we're interested in! Having the aforementioned lower, simpler antenna and A-B switching arrangement with your main DXing antenna system would be a practical alternative. Good E-skip DXing to all-and let us hope it's a long season with plenty of cochannel complaints to all our locals!!!

Even if copies of the magazine itself aren't available, don't forget to check the microfilm files. The Omaha Public Library, for example, has every <u>OST</u> on microfilm from 1949 to the current date. Various journals, such as "Radio Science", "Journal of Atmospheric and Terrestrial Physics", several IEEE titles, and the "Journal of Geophysical Research" many times contain highly technical propagation information.

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#### PHILADELPHIA - - - WESTINGHOUSE VS RCA

INTRODUCTION: Many of you will recall the 1956 facility swap involving the NBC owned stations in Cleveland and the Westinghouse properties in Philadelphia. You probably also remember that almost ten years later the deal was reversed; but do you know why? Stand by for the snawer.

THE PLAYERS:

alliance was the most powerful in the television industry. They manufactured the majority of transmitting, studio, and home receiving equipment; they owned and operated stations in major markets, they operated the premiere television network; and they had recently become the frontrunner in color technology. On the other hand, Westinghouse (owner of less than a handful of early tv stations) was considered, at best, to be a secondary industry force.

BACKGROUND: Channel 3 in Phildelphia began operation in 1948 as WPTZ (tv); a licensee of the Philco Corporation. (Note for younger readers: Philco had manufactured radios for years and also marketed first generation tv receivers.) In 1953 Philco sold the station to Westinghouse; long-time owner of Philadelphia's KYW Radio. The new owners retained the WPTZ call letters for channel 3. It was a lucrative deal with Philco pocketing a hefty [for that time] \$8.5 million for the NBC network affiliate. It was also 1948 when NBC put WNBK (tv) on the air on channel 3 in Cleveland. NBC also owned and operated WTAM AM S FM in the Ohio city.

THE TURF...PHILADELPHIA: NBC did not own a station in 'The City of Brotherly Love'...and they wented one badly. Why the RCA subsidiary was not in Philly at the onset of commercial licensing is speculative...as is their failure to buy channel 3 from original owner Philoo. (Ed. note: I don't have any information as to whether RCA/NBC made a bid at the time Westinghouse bought WPTZ, but suspect they may have; and were outbid by Group W.) At any rate, NBC made overtures to Westinghouse entailing a 'swap' of their AM FM and TV operations in Cleveland...plus \$3 million cash...for the Westinghouse AM-TV combo in Philadelphia. With due apologies to Clevelanders, the reason for the proposal is obvious...NBC wanted the bigger market with much greater revenue potential.

MICE OFFER...BUT...: Westinghouse initially rejected the RCA/NBC proposal, indicating it was quite happy with things the way they stood. However the Sernoff (RCA) camp in New York wasn't going to take no for an answer and threatened to move into Philadelphia and build their own operation from scratch (assuming they could obtain a license for a new channel). They further threatened to yank the NBC affiliation away from WPTZ. When Westinghouse assessed the damage potentional of the situation, they decided they had been backed into a corner; and that it would be prudent to accept the offer rather than risk the consquences. As a result, on February 13, 1956, WPTZ ceased to exist and become WRCV-TV; and WNEK become KYW-TV. The radio companions simultaneously become KYW AM S FM (Cleveland) and WRCV [AM] (Philadelphia).

#### WESTINGHOUSE vs RCA...continued:


A DONE DEAL?: Although RCA/NBC had achieved its' goal, Westinghouse was far from pleased and filed a lawsuit contesting the validity of the transaction claiming it had been a victim of coercion. The fight was on! This was a legal battle royal of two corporate giants. Although RCA/NBC was the larger of the two in the broadcast arena, Westinghouse was no midget. It too was a group owner of radio and tv stations; as well as a manufacturer of tv receivers, electrical hardware, and appliances.

A LAWYER'S DREAM: Public records do not reflect the cost of the ensuing litigation, but it's safe to assume that at least two law firms shoveled in enormous amounts of legal fees in this matter. It took almost 9 years to reach a settlement. When the wrangling finally ended, a federal court had decided that RCA/NBC had indeed engaged in coercion; and issued an order that the Federal Communications Commission cause the parties involved to return the properties to their original owners.

THE AFTERMATH: On February 17, 1965 the KYW calls were returned to Philadelphia (channel 3 did not revert to WPTZ, but became KYW-TV...radio went back to KYW) under Westinghouse ownership. NBC's forced return to Cleveland brought about still another set of call letters...WKYC AM, FM and TV...forsaking the original WNBK/WTAM identification.

STILL LATER: Over the years, Westinghouse has made very few changes in its' portfolio of broadcast holdings; and the KYW properties have remained in the Group W camp to this day. The story was slightly different in Cleveland. RCA/NBC sold the radio stations about five years after the re-swap with Westinghouse; and RCA/NBC's successor General Electric sold WKYC-tv to Metromedia in 1990.

SUMMARY: This particular case is unparalleled in U.S. broadcast history. It is the only scenario where an FCC approved transfer of major market properties (involving large group owners) was voided by court order and the parties mandated by the FCC to return the facilities to pre-transfer ownership status. Information is not available as to whether Westinghouse had to return the \$3 million cash from the original transfer to RCA; nor is mention made as to whether NBC was compelled to pay the Westinghouse court costs for the prolonged period of adjudication.

#### LAST YEAR'S E-SKIP: REMARKABLE SIMILARITIES ON BOTH SIDES OF THE ATLANTIC!

Let me first start with a short description of the 1992 Es-season as we here in Northwestern Europe experienced it. Also will follow the European story about the transAtlantic-Es of the 22nd of June 1992. Unfortunately it looks like this TA passed over here in Holland??

When I read the description (September 1992 VUD, page 54) concerning the USA 1992 Es-season, it strikes me that the characters of this season were remarkably similar! Here too were long periods with absolutely no Es TVDX conditions at all and just when hope was given up completely for seeing nice Es TV DX, conditions turned to the other side of the scale, with very reasonable to even excellent Es- possibilities. When conditions were good, mostly for several days in a row, a rather unusual characteristic could be witnessed. In our part of the world it is more or less normal with Es-conditions that you receive Es from one direction at the time. In the summer of 1992, most of the times Es occurred, it came from all directions at the same time! Norway / Finland / Commonwealth of Independent States (ex-USSR) / ex-Yugoslavia / Italy / Spain and Portugal could be received at the same time, there was no outspoken preference for one direction as was quite normal during former Es-seaons here in Western Europe.

On the other hand, when Es-TVDX became possible, most of the time conditions were astonishingly good. Band-1 (ie: low band) TV transmitters could be received from the Middle-East at least on 9(!) separate days in May, June and July with, just like in 1990 many receptions of Iranian TV transmitters on channels E2, E3 & E4 over distances of at least 4000km and maybe considerably more! Syria could be seen too several times on E3 and E4, also rather unusual! Only the reception of the Jordan E3 transmitter can more or less be considered as normal.

On the 17th of June I myself received besides SRT1 (3155km), and JTV1 (3375km) on ch E3 and IRIB ch E2 ( $\pm$ /-4000km), also MIDDLE EAST TV on E3 from Lebanon (3230km) and a tentative reception of TRT1 Bagisli, Turkey on E3 (3430km) all with rather clear pictures!

Also rather interesting is the Es-reception of 6 meter-HAM's and TV-stations from the North American continent in Germany in the northern city of Bremen on "Superday:" 22th of June, 1992. The same date as is mentioned in September 1992's VUD "Special Report." On that particular date Frank Helmbold, editor in chief of of the German TV/FMDX magazine REFLEXION, received several TV transmitters most likely to be originating from Canada. Via an ICOM R7000 three audio carriers of channel A2 were heard, at least one of them in the French language (Tentative: Rimouski, QUEBEC!). Offsets received: -10 kHz, Zero, +10 kHz in FMnarrow-mode. TV-channel A3 could be detected too by Frank. On A3's audiofrequency two offsets -10 kHz and + 10 kHz were detected, unfortunately too weak for proper identification.

Out of REFLEXION No. 105, July 1992 the following summary of the things that happened in northern Germany during that remarkable Es-opening.

Start: 1245 hrs, with first reception of the Newfoundland 6-meter beacon V01ZA with strength: 559. Around 1600 hrs first USA 6-meter HAM's from K1 / W1 (New England) in QSO with Germany. At the same time, 6-meter QSO's were also made between Germany and Cyprus + Israel. Around 1800 hrs 6-meter QSO's from VE1 / 2 / 3. With, up to 2200 reception of the Greenland Beacon OX3VHF and 6-meter QSO's with the Azores. Around 2210 hrs the reception of audio signals of TV-Channels A2 and A3 by Frank Helmbold in Bremen GERMANY. 6-meter traffic between between Germany and USA/Canada up to 2358 hrs. Then this wonderful "TransAtlantic" Es-opening for more than 11 hours had come to an end. Unfortunately it appears that this particular 22nd of June "TransAtlantic" had only minor impact in Holland. I only managed to to receive in the above mentioned timewindow one HAM from Cuba in the 10-meterband and the 29.250 MHz Lebanon packet transmitter both via Espropagation. (Note: All times mentioned are in GMT/UTC.)



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
