

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

If any members need any assistance in ID'ing stations from the Colorado region of the country, drop me a line. If you're contemplating hosting a convention, I'd be happy to pass along assistance. (Any other assistance? Sorry, my bank balance is \$0, hi!) Here's hoping 1997 brings you some good DX! Thanks again.

Two subjects are on my mind this time around. First thought is about Don Wildmon and his WAFR translator network. He's made a wise choice about putting them in smaller towns, where his old-fashioned ideals are more widely accepted than in a major market. No one would be crazy enough to put a WAFR translator on top of the Empire State Building in New York, the Transamerica Pyramid in San Francisco, or the John Hancock Building in downtown Chicago. Reverend Wildmon may be a hero of the Christian faith, but only to the Protestants, in my honest opinion. Catholics have their own "heroes of the faith", including Pope John Paul II, John Cardinal O'Connor, Mother Teresa and Mother Angelica. One "hero" Mormons frequently talk about is Brigham Young. Other non-Christian faiths have their own "heroes", like Muhammad in the Islamic faith, or an outspoken rabbi in the Jewish faith.

I think that TBN is a reincarnated PTL. Look no further than the appearances Dr. Paul Crouch has made on his umpteen stations. I disgaree with Lenny Goldberg's assumption that Family Radio is a "hotbed of false teaching". Family Radio's mission is purely to teach the Bible to the masses, without getting embroiled in controversy. TBN and even the American Family Association have been embroiled in controversy at one time or another.

The second thing on my mind is counting call letter changes. It would be wrong not to count call letter changes as separate stations. While the facilities may be the same, a call letter change, in many cases, also signals a format and/or ownership change for the station. The change also comes with a whole different philosophy on programming, station-listener relations, along with new management and on-air staff. Recently, WKBQ-FM 104.1, a CHR station, changed to Modern AC as WALC. In reality, 104.1 in Jerseyville, IL is counted twice (once for WKBQ-FM, once for WALC). If you've been in the hobby at least a dozaen years, it can be counted four times (WJBM-FM, WKKX, WKBO-FM, WALC). In those twelve years, four different stations occupied 104.1. Four different philosophies means four different stations. If you're not counting call letter changes, you're making a big mistake, in my honest opinion. Another example is 106.5 in Granite City, IL. Since 1975, they've had the calls WGNU-FM. WWWK, KWK-FM, WKBQ and WKKX-FM. One station or five? Or, how about 103.3 in St. Louis? Since 1980, they've been known as KMOX-FM, KHTR and KLOU. One station or three? 93.7 in the same city? Since 1975, they've been known as KCFM and KSD-FM. One station or two? Or how about 97.1 in Florissant, MO? Since they signed on in 1977, they've had the calls KSCF, KCFM, KLTH, KHTK, and KXOK. One station or five? In each case, 97.1 and 106.5 are counted five times, 103.3 is counted three times, and 93.7 is counted twice. Only the non-commercial stations (except KSIV-FM 91.5), WIL-92.3, KSHE-94.7, KFUO-FM 99.1, KEZK-102.5 and WCBW-104.9 could really be counted as one station in this market, since they've only had one set of calls since 1980. KSIV-FM is counted twice, once under the present calls, and once as KSLH. Not counting call letter changes really drags down your totals, in my honest opinion.

(Editor's note: While many DXers have unique ways of counting stations in their personal logs, comparison of totals with other WTFDAers in 'TV Statistics' or 'FM Statistics' requires a set of common guidelines, to be used by all members for reporting to these columns. The use of other counting methods in those forums automatically contaminates the validity of the statistics, and should not be used when reporting 'WTFDA-recognized' log totals. - mcs)

The Quebec changes reflect the grant of Canwest Global's application to take over CKMI-5 and affiliate it with CGS. CKMI is currently a privately-owned affiliate of the CBC's English-language network. Canadian government approval of the affiliation change is contingent on the CBC completing a new transmitter to carry the English-language service in Quebec City. The new station will presumably be a satellite of CBMT-6 Montreal. Channels 20, 33, 38, and 65 are available for such a service. In Ottawa, I can find no record of a CITY-TV-3. I don't know what channel this is on, but suspect channel 65.

Apparently WJKS-17 decided not to spend the February ratings sweeps promoting programs that would air on a different station; they made an early jump to WB affiliation. I was also surprised how quickly long-dormant WYDP-25 was brought on line. The WJXX call change had been publicized for channel 21, but it looks like it actually applies to the channel 25 station.

K22DD Santa Clara, California has applied for permission to experiment with DTV broadcasts. A Seattle station (KING-5? I forget which one) has also applied for an experimental DTV license.

KNAZ-2 and KMOH-6 have been sold to the owners of KPNX-12 Phoenix. KNAZ is already a NBC affiliate -- my guess is KMOH will follow suit, but that's just a guess.

Pappas Telecasting has 15 new-station applications pending before the FCC. (actually 14, now that the one in Sioux City, Iowa has been granted) They tell *Broadcasting and Cable* that any of the 15 that are granted will become WB affiliates. To be honest, this seems unlikely in Sioux City, which one of the larger markets lacking a Fox station.

Silver King Broadcasting has hired a national news director. You should expect to begin seeing local programming on the Home Shopping Network stations in a few months.

FORUM

Randy Miltier, Ashland OR:

The massive success of cable and satellite TV has had a few victims. One of the more obvious is the outdoor TV antenna. Another one we don't tend to think about is the TV translator. Viewers in rural parts of Eastern Oregon may soon find their translator service shut down, and may not realize exactly what they'll lose!

An article in the Portland Oregonian says the Blue Mountain Translator District is in financial trouble, and may have to vote to disband. The District provides, for a \$50 annual fee, the signals of Portland stations KATU-2, KOIN-6, KGW-8, and KPTV-12, along with KTVB-7 Boise. (KPDX-49 is also translated from the sites, but KPDX pays for their own equipment and may ironically be the only available over-the-air service — except for PBS affiliate KTVR-13 — if the translator district shuts down!) Five counties in eastern Oregon are covered by 29 translators at 6 sites. The District has a current annual income of \$60,000 annually, but expenses are over twice that. Last November, a referendum was held in Union County on increasing the annual fee to \$75; the vote failed.

If the translators are shut down, most cable subscribers will still receive Portland TV; the signals reach eastern Oregon by microwave. However, some smaller cable systems use the translators - and District President Cecil McDonald tells the paper some of these cable systems aren't paying the annual fee. Of course, satellite users will receive no local programming without the translators.

John Ebeling, Bloomington MN:

John forwards an item from the Duluth News-Tribune about the on again, off again operation of KNLD-21. The station first predicted an air date of spring 1994, then a LMA with KBJR-6 and a Fox/UPN affiliation beginning in the fall of 1994. It finally did sign on in April 1995 — for three hours a day. Today, KNLD airs 21 hours of home-shopping a day from the KQDS-FM tower. At 44.7KW ERP, KNLD is considerably more powerful than the wireless-cable system in Duluth — but not much stronger than TBN's K58CM. Last November. KNLD's owners. Fant Broadcasting, purchased KQDS and began plans to either fortify the existing FM tower, or build a new tower, to support an antenna that would allow KNLD to operate at a more reasonable power. There's currently an application at the FCC to 550KW at 305m HAAT.





DXing IN 1932!

(edited by Tom Bryant)

The material selected for you this month is reprinted (with permission) from a website containing a vast array of historical broadcast data, and maintained by Jeff Miller. EARLY RECEPTION REPORTS

(The New York Times, August 7, 1932)

Television stations are beginning to receive fan mail and television impresarios and engineers are studying letters to find out how far the images travel and if an object or person can be identified after a flight through space

Inght through space

Those who have no television in the home today probably wonder what they might pluck from the air if they did look in on the passing waves. The letters received by W2XAB, operated by the Columbia Broadcasting System, New York, unfold an interesting story on television in 1932."

I picked up your station very clear and held it for about twenty-five minutes," said an observer at Raleigh, N.C.

That is 425 miles from Manhattan Island, where the images leaped into the air

from aerial wires atop 485 Madison Avenue.

And from Bristol, Tenn., an ethereal spectator reports, "I am able to see the eyes, eyebrows, teeth, and notice the changes in expression. Often when some one is playing a violin more than once I have noticed a ring on the violinist's finger. I have been looking in on your station for six months or more."

These television images seem to have no difficulty in jumping over New York skyscrapers for a long-distance hop.

It was thought for a while that the tall steel structures might block or snatch them from the air before they could fly across the Hudson. But such is not the case.

For example, from Stevens Point, Wis., this report was received: "Imagine my amazement when I received your television program on Friday night from 9 to 11 o'clock. It was wonderful and more than 1,000 miles distant! Your singers, the violinist and the announcer together with the station identification card were perfect. Do you transmit sound in synchronism with the pictures and, if so, on what channel does the sound travel?"

Some of the spectators are handicapped in reception of the pictures because they have no definite copy or program of the television schedule. They have to hunt around on the dial for the faces, which in their current state are somewhat elusive. Then they write to the transmitter for verification as in the early days of (radio) broadcasting.

"While experimenting with a television set last night we are quite sure that we intercepted some of your pictures from New York," said an observer in Montreal. "We saw several pictures between 10:15 and 10:45 P.M. The first was a man and two others were women. They seemed to be different persons.

The same images that dance through the air to Dixie and Wisconsin are also seen in New England. They travel in all directions in much the same way as musical (AM radio) broadcasts.

An observer at Waterbury, Conn., said: "We have been receiving the W2XAB television broadcasts with fair success".

Congratulations on the excellent visual programs we are receiving from your station," said a spectator in Middlebury, Vt., in writing to W2XAB. "Reception is very dependable and the signal strength is quite

sufficient for good quality, in fact, of the six television stations I receive regularly, yours gives the greatest detail. I have especially enjoyed seeing the dancer and the boxing bouts. For reception at this distance I find that it is much better to have the actress dressed in white or light clothes for far-from-television vision".

The background should be given attention. Passing shadows of persons not in the field of vision are extremely annoying and confusing. May I suggest that your announcements be made by visual card as far as possible? Interruption of the regular signal throws off the automatic synchronization in most cases, and this is most annoying."

The images seem to have sufficient power in their wings to lift them across the Mississippi toward the Kansas wheat fields. An observer at Manhattan, Kan, reports: "Station W2XAB comes in very clear and strong. I receive all the evening programs regularly. I enjoyed the recent fight broadcast and would like to see more of that type of performance."

Cartoons drawn in front of the electric eyes in New York have been picked out of the air at Fairmont, W. Va., according to the following report: "I received the pictures broadcast by W2XAB. The cartoons were very clear. The plate on my neon tube seems to be divided into four parts, because I see four images of the same person or picture. I cannot understand why this condition exists instead of one large picture."

A spectator at Adrian, Mich., asserts that he is an interested looker-in on the W2XAB evening entertainment. Occasionally the pictures are very clear by the time they arrive in Michigan, but some difficulty is experienced in fading. He feels that more power is needed to send the faces from New York into that area with good signal strength in the daytime. The sunlight curtails the images that travel on certain wave lengths in much the same way that it shortens the range of (AM) broadcasting stations."

"Last night I succeeded in bringing in the picture of a partially bald-headed man on my television machine," said an observer at West Point, Neb. "The image was quite clear, but I could not hold it long. There was some fading. The man moved his head quite often. The lips could be seen to move. I did not hear the sound. This is the only station I have succeeded in framing and I hope you can verify

reception of this partially bald-headed person."

"Television has its problems," said William Schudt, director of W2XAB. "Television also has its limitations, and plenty of them. For example, we are limited in pictorial representations to three people. We cannot show full-length pictures with sufficient signal power to register properly in the home receiver."

We plan programs for the limits of present television. Boxing is presented in a miniature ring. Dick Madeo, who has presented many of the exhibitions, has learned to box in circles, always within the focus of the light ray. The engineers likewise have adjusted their scanning apparatus so that it may be adjusted rapidly to follow the fighters in a limited space around the ring."

Scenic backdrops are now used with the result that lookers-in obtain the illusion of a full stage. These had to be designed with care. Heavy outlines of simple designs in black and white show up the best. Ordinary scenery with its delicate shadings is useless with television in its present state, but adaptations of black and white designs made out of proportion give amazing results. So perfectly did one scene come through that it caused considerable comment among observers when it was put on the air for the first time.

It was a skyline view of New York, showing the buildings silhouetted in black against a white sky. Immediately following the test seven telephone callers inquired if W2XAB was actually scanning from the roof of the building, which incidentally overlooks a similar skyline. In reality, it was a cardboard cutout on which rough sketches had been made.

(Editor's comments: One thing that intrigued me about this report was the fact that ANY television receiving equipment was to be found in middle-America in 1932! Another point of interest was the report that mentioned SIX stations on the air. Also, it is important to keep in mind that W2XAB operated on a 100 kHz wide channel between 2.0 and 2.1 mHz. Thus, consistent nighttime reception (similar to the AM 'skywave' conditions familiar to most VUD readers! was indeed possible in such locations as Wisconsin, Michigan, Kansas, and Nebraska. Wouldn't you have loved to have been DXing during this embryonic stage of television development? I know that I wish I'd been in on it!)

In Santa Barbara, southern CA coastal tropo DX to San Diego/Tijuana (Ch. 6-69, 175-200 mi) was fair on Jan 8-10, Jan. 18, Jan. 31-Feb. 1, and Feb. 3. That was the extent of it, which wasn't much. The air layering attempted similar stability at times in second half of February, but didn't develop much after several starts.

In Wasco, on Feb. 16-17 (the first time I've been there this year), KNSO-51 Merced (145 mi. N) was the strongest yet seen in Wasco (entirely snowfree) by short-distance tropo on Feb. 16 afternoon. (KNSO is fairly new, having started approx. May 1996.) There was nothing more distant, though, probably because of a weather front approaching from north and northwest, stirring up the otherwise stable air layering. Too bad I hadn't gotten there sooner. Later that night, KNSO was weaker. By the next morning (Feb. 17), it was raining in Wasco with no more tropo.

Pardon me for breaking in here with a non-TV report. We've had an unusually dry February and March here in northern CA, with frequent winds blowing from land to sea. These developed conditions suitable for long distance tropo, and we saw the first reports in the month of February of the 2m and 70 cm KH6HME beacon on Mt. Haleakala, Hawaii.

Bob, K6QXY, near Sebastopol was the first to hear it on 144.17 MHz and 432.075 MHz around 1600Z on February 18 (that's 8 AM PST). K7RR/6 in Morro Bay reported hearing the 144 MHz beacon weakly at 2030Z. K7JA/6 in Garden Grove reported it at 2358Z. I heard it at 0145Z (Feb. 19 UTC date), 0345, and 0600Z.

Furthest reception on the 8th with extremely weak signals from Tampa area for about 30 minutes. February was a bad month for Tropospheric reception. This is a poor beginning for the year, I hope next three months conditions will improve as they are usually the best months here for this.

I asked Pat Dyer to tell us how he catches his DX- does he stay glued to the TV 24 hours a day, or record it all? I also asked him to tell us more about reading stuff in the VBI (Vertical Blanking Interval). Here are his comments, along with his DX for the past couple months.

Pat Dyer, WA5IYX, 5315 Silvertip Drive, San Antonio, TX 78228-2744

Since late Jan I've been rather "consumed" with WWW wanderings having gotten SW Bell as a full ISP! In fact, I'd better be getting off my re-sub to the VUD as it expires this month. The Transguide system has some 3W pages - mentions UHF LPTV for media distribution, but not Ch 54 per se. I see that the likely xmtr site is the TX Highway Dpt tower that's a scant 2 mi NE of me (no wonder that I get overload spurs!)

Also, with the Comet Hale-Bopp much time has been spent with the Web sites and the aprox twice a week good weather views here. Some 35-mm Kodacolor 400 attempts with a Pentax K-1000 50-mm & f/2 using bulb exposure up to 45 seconds. (This is a 36-frame reel that still has the fading phases of last year's Hyakutake on it.) The 1994 8-mm RCA camcorder at low light and full (8X) zoom with manual focus is providing more instant gratification - with some of the dust tail showing well even into bright twilight. The ion tail is mostly lost to the eye in the SA light pollution (hoping that the 35-mm will show it). The other morning with the 40-mm ocular on my 6" f/8 Newtonian reflector I could still see the head of it to within 5-min of local sunrise!

Western TV DX (Pat Dyer's report continues)

Virtually all of my TV/FM DX has been "live" loggings. Back in the mid 1970's I tried some COR circuits for automated meteor scatter on FM. That was short-lived for two reasons-(1) tropo would sometimes key my 1968 vintage RS reel-to-reel recorder and consume the 600' of a 3 - 1/2" reel at 1-7/8" ips (nothing like an hour of a faint 94.5 Harlingen!) and (2) my lone 94.5 Phoenix ID that way during the 1974 Perseids could only vaguely be logged as 02-- as mono track w/o any way to encode the time. (I was using the SX- 62 avc line or the s-meter line from the Allied 426-thru a 741 dc op amp-that always seemed to want a different differential resistor value every time that I hooked it up!)

A more-clever guy in VE3-land {Ed-Ontario, Canada} back then had a sophisticated system that used a 555 timer to turn his on for 10-min blocks centered on the hour/half hour (more chances of news, wx, ID, ads, etc). He didn't have to worry about signal thresholds etc. doing it that way!

Some have suggested that running a T-120 at EP with an audio feed from the FM set would be a way for ms {Ed-meteor scatter}(as I could date/time encode the video with just the raster from the 8-mm camcorder). Trouble is there are fewer and fewer suitable FM frequencies without some residual tropo station (though the TM-1001's 1-dB capture ratio can "quickly" bring the DX over that!)

During the Es season leaving the DX set tuned to Ch 2 (with the local LPTV nulled as best-aimed NE) is the normal practice. However, many a time flipping by Ch 3 would show KOTA-3 and a few others who have the geometry etc to come in without any traces of a Ch 2. RFI from the 486 and 386 CPU's (though mostly the VGA monitor) has become a definite hindrance there if I'm trying to get things done with the keyboard at the same time!

The Bearcat scanner (an old, 1987, 175-XL with only 16 channels) with a judicious choice of frequencies can give early warning of Es. However, during the summer season there's so much of that that it becomes almost useless. During the high solar flux years the 30-40 MHz F2 MUF conflicts with its value for much Es during the off-season daytime. (Of course heavy Es will often end up masking the F2 MUF for me!)

The current TV DX system uses the 1987 Emerson VCR with its a/v out going to the 9" b&w (1994) CCTV monitor as well as the 1993 Magnavox VCR. That way I can rapidly change channels while running a T-120 without having to pause the tape. Normal pause/start cycles are about 7 seconds each way before actual taping would occur-far too cumbersome to catch the 10-second or so TV ID windows during

those station breaks.

Comments:

So much tropo Mar 3-4 on UHF (many 3 deep) that I just gave it up. The hold-down varactor tuning buttons (no direct-channel access) and only 4 memories don't lend to rapid/accurate DXing for Ch 14-69-and so many of those are HSN/TBN items that have so fleeting ID's. Not knowing if one is really on Ch 21, 22, or 23 doesn't help either. Accidentally going much "below" Ch 14 automatically puts the Emerson into its hi- VHF band (this does tune those CATV frequencies-so it's not an instant Ch 13!) All of which can be a real time-consuming adventure to recover from. Mexico Ch 11 was so strong that it dominated even when I was pointed at Houston!

The stuff that I'm seeing in the Mexican TV's VBI is NOT encoded like closed-caption. It's plain text viewable when the VBI is rolled into the kine scanned frame. XERV-9 Reynosa a few years ago was the first time that I'd noted anything like this (though I'd sure wished that the US stations could have done something similar since the early 1960's!) There is a little bit of distortion -but that Azteca network number is usually easy to read (via tropo and Es).

The VBI lettering is white on black or grey-one of the advantages of having a video display terminal that lets me adjust the vertical hold! The 9" CCTV horizontal hold is also on the front panel, but being recessed it needs a small tool to engage it.

With Es fading the vertical sync is usually lost often enough for the frame to roll on its own and reveal that there's more than vertical blanking, horizontal synch/equalizing, and closed-caption coding "hiding" in there!

Back in the early-60's I'd noticed that there were some "strange white" stable pulses of various durations in the VBI (a term not then that commonly used at least by me!) They used to change the patterns periodically-and seemed to be only on the network feeds. In early 1964 I just happened to come across an "Electronics World" issue at my high school library

Western TV DX (Pat Dyer's report concludes)

(I'd been getting that et. al. regularly 1959-62). It explained that those were various test signals used to evaluate the network feed quality-going into great detail as to what each was for I still have my hand-scrawled copy from it around here somewhere.

When word came out in the early/mid 70's that the VBI was targeted for closed-caption text I opined that I'd only really care if they'd find a way to stick the call letters in there!

The August 1996 JVC 13" color set (replacing a near-defunct 13" 1987 RCA) had the added (unrealized until I saw it on the carton!) bonus of closed-caption. I soon learned how atrocious "on the fly" caption spelling was (as well as "their" for "there", etc.)-or often just being plain wrong in context. Lots of "fun" going back over my T-120 tapes since 1987 to see how much of that was being done a decade ago. Even some of the old DX tapes were strong enough to show it! Being able to feed the Emerson into the Magnavox into the JVC I can see such things live now as well (while still having the b&w image on the CCTV monitor).

Correspondence with Danny Oglethorpe

As you know, due to band over-crowding, out-of-band radio interference, and other problems, DXing is constantly becoming more difficult. The new transmitter that local KTBS-3 put on the air on October 2, 1995 has hindered my DX to some extent on channels 2 and 4. In December 1995, a new source of interference arose on all low-band channels, putting permanent diagonal lines on my once-clear TV signals. Cable TV is another problem from time to time. These are just a few of the problems.

This last October a new source of interference appeared. At first, I thought KTBS-3 had modified their transmitter or antenna, but I'm not sure now. Fortunately the problem comes and goes. It looks like channel 3 is sending out signals on channels 2 and 4-in every direction. I have trouble even pulling in strong Es through this mess, and weak Es and tropo don't have a chance.

Is it possible for signals from a nearby ham to cause this condition? Would a trap for channel 3 help?

I am sorry to hear about your interference problems. I would like to help you identify the cause(s). Unfortunately, you are there, and I am here. If you have not identified the station, could you please send me a tape recording? You might also send me your address and local street map so that I could determine which licensed radio amateur stations were close to you. Unfortunately there is no similar database for CB or other non-licensed stations.

There are a variety of non-licensed sources of RF that can and do interfere with TV. Chief among these are home computers. There also are a multitude of non-linear devices that can mix out-of-band signals to produce in-band spurious signals. The spurious signals generated by these devices may become 20-30 dB stronger for every 10 dB increase of the strongest signal hitting the device. The first suspect of being a non-linear device in any such case is an antenna-mounted preamplifier. The second suspect is corrosion in the antenna/feedline system.

Then there is the TV set itself, which may even pick up strong signals in the IF and audio sections.

The solutions are: get rid of the non-linearity and/or reduce the strength of the strongest signals getting into it. A high-pass filter before any amplification is highly desirable. As considerable signal may be picked up by only an inch or so of exposed wire, coaxial cable is also called for. A trap for channel 3 before any amplification would probably help too.

There are some very good coaxial filters available these days, but we should identify what frequencies the stations are on (besides Ch. 3) that are getting into your system. If indeed they are not transmitting on Ch. 2 and 4 then you have a good chance of solving your problem.

I have read one report, however, of a solid-state exciter for a channel 3 TV transmitter generating out of band signals. Keep in mind that although the products are supposed to be 80 dB down from the video carrier, 80 dB down may not be enough to keep you from having troubles with receiving weak DX.

Although the KTBS-3 video appears on channels 3 and 4, I've noticed that the audio is not there. In fact, the picture has a herringbone pattern on it--similar to what FM interference can do to a TV signal. In addition, I've heard some sounds on channel 4 that remind me of some kind of electronic switching or testing system (over the KTBS video).

Is it possible that KTBS-3 is really sending a signal on other frequencies? Could this be a legal test that is related to HDTV? It is always difficult to explain to anyone about DXing (especially TV DXing), but at the risk of appearing nutty) I should contact the KTBS engineering staff if the problem continues.
